World Crop 7.1 Percent Less

Washington (AP)—This year's world hop crop was 7.1 percent smaller than last year's, the department of agriculture estimated in a report released Tuesday.
The 1953 crop was estimated at 132 million pounds compared with 143 million last year. U. S. production was 41,752,000 compared with 61,263,000 in 1952.

U. S. exports from the 1952 crop were 14,265,000 pounds compared with 12,355,000 the previous year.
The report said that one of the outstanding features of the export trade was the large quantity sold to European markets—4,654,000 pounds—compared with 615,000 pounds in the 1951-52 season.

Ore. November Building Drops

Building permits in 19 major Oregon cities amounted to \$4,958,768 in November, 36 percent below the \$7,772,000 recorded in November, 1952. Salem, forced to compete with an abnormally large November, 1952 total, showed the biggest percentage drop, 75. But Salem was far ahead of all other upstate cities with \$920,016.
