Mushrooms a la Creme
Ingredients: 1/2 pound medium size mushrooms, 3 tablespoons butter or margarine, salt and pepper, 1/4 teaspoon flour, 1/4 cup cream.

Method: Rinse mushrooms quickly in cold water; wipe dry; cut a thin slice from stem ends and discard. Slice mushrooms vertically through caps and stems. Melt butter in 8-inch skillet; add mushrooms and cook over moderate low heat until partly wilted, stirring for several minutes. Turn heat low and cover tightly; cook about 5 minutes longer so juices accumulate. Sprinkle lightly with salt and pepper. Stir in flour until it disappears. Add cream; stir until sauce thickens; add more salt and pepper if necessary. Makes 3 to 4 servings.
