Aged Oak Falls At Dallas High

Dallas, Ore. (AP)—A huge oak tree crashed at the entrance to Dallas High School Wednesday a few minutes after students had cleared from the area to enter afternoon classes.

About 100 feet tall and four feet in diameter, the tree toppled over from the effects of age-weakened roots and heavy rains which loosened the soil.

It fell onto the concrete slab at the school entrance, but no damage was noted.

It long had been a landmark. It was on the campus when Dallas College was in existence. Some residents estimated it was 100 years old.

'BABY TORNADO' RIPS ROOFS

Chillicothe, Ohio (AP)—A wind storm, described by witnesses as a "baby tornado," whistled through a west side residential section of this southern Ohio city last night, ripping off roofs, uprooting trees, leveling garages and tearing down power lines.

Damage was estimated at \$100,000. No one was hurt.

RED 'WELCOMES' DECISION
