Bible Display At Englewood

As a special commemoration of Universal Bible Sunday, rare Bibles will be on display Sunday morning and evening at the Englewood Evangelical United Brethren church.

The Bibles loaned to the church by various families are both old and interesting in their histories. Among these is one ransacked and tattered manuscript which served as a daily devotional guide to the Stephens family, who crossed the plains by ox team in 1862. This family coming from Iowa settled near Hopewell. Another elaborate and picturesque volume is a Luther's German translation of the Holy Scriptures printed in Nuremberg, Germany, shortly after the Protestant Reformation.

The languages represented are Hebrew, Greek, Spanish, Swedish, German and English. Also on display for congregational interest is an early pioneer saddle bag, typical of those used by the early circuit riding missionary to carry his Bible.

Historical comments concerning the Bibles will be made by the pastor at the Sunday Morning Worship Service. Other families possessing old and rare Bibles are invited to bring them for display Sunday.
