Snap Beans, Italian-Style
Ingredients: 1 pound snap beans, 1/4 cup boiling water, 1/4 teaspoon salt, 2 tablespoons olive oil, 1 tablespoon wine vinegar, pepper.

Method: Cut ends from beans; scrub in cold water. Slice beans in half lengthwise to make thin strips; then cut in half crosswise. Add to water and salt; bring to boil; cook rapidly, covered, until tender-crisp—7 to 10 minutes. Drain off small amount of water remaining. Return to skillet with oil and vinegar; toss well and reheat; add more salt if necessary and pepper to taste. Makes 4 servings.
