The Lucia legend is enacted in homes by the eldest daughter, who carries coffee and cakes to the bedside of each member of the family, awakening them

by traditional singing. Robed in white and wearing a wreath of greens and lighted candles, she is a symbolic figure in the candle celebration, and is accompanied by young boys carrying stars and candles, and singing traditional carols.

Mrs. Morrell Cray is arranging an enactment of this celebration for each day of the tea. In the role of St. Lucia will be Miss Yvonne Pool, student at Salem high school, who will sing the Lucia song.
