

High School Clubs Offer Annual Carnival Tonite

Salem High School's annual interclub carnival will be held tonight at 7:30 in the high school auditorium. The program, which is around the theme of "Fifty for Four Fancy," is put on by the clubs of the school and is sponsored by Civic Club and the Associated Student Body.

A queen and her two crown princesses will reign over the evening with the announcement and crowning taking place early in the carnival. They were voted from a group of 22 Tuesday by the student body.

The thought of the scenario is school life 50 years ago with

the skits by the clubs centering around this idea. In the scenario seven high school students are thinking about the division of the school for next year when the new South Salem high school opens and then one thinks that school life 50 years ago was better.

Peak Named For Lt. Scott

In commemoration of Lt. Gordon D. Scott, USC and GS, who lost his life in the service of his country while engaged in surveying operations in Mt. McKinley Park, Alaska, the U.S. board of geographic names has approved a recommendation that one of the mountains located near the scene of the fatal accident be named Scott Peak.

The peak with an elevation of about 8,800 feet is located in Mt. McKinley Park, approximately 33 miles northeast of Mount McKinley.

Lt. Scott lost his life while engaged in an aerial-mapping mission over some of the most difficult terrain on earth. He was born in Portland, July 11, 1925, and received his education in the public schools of Nehalem, Ore., and attended Oregon State College. He enlisted in the navy V-12 program at the University of Washington in 1943 and was commissioned ensign in November, 1945.

Lt. Scott entered the service of the coast and geodetic survey in 1948 and his assignments with the bureau included service aboard the USC&GS ship Pathfinder in Alaska, Arctic survey parties in the Point Barrow area and field parties in Texas, Colorado, and Nevada.

He is survived by his father, John H. Scott, a retired Oregon State highway engineer and his mother, Elizabeth, of Neahkanie Beach and a brother, Lewis of Salem, who is geologist with the State Highway Department.
