The Oregon State Associa-tion of Chiropodists are con-ducting a foot survey of the school children of Oregon, and Salem is the first city in the

school children of Oregon, and Salem is the first city in the state to have the survey.

To date 522 children have been examined, and it is hoped that all children in the grade schools will be. However this will depend on willingness of PTA groups. All surveys are conducted free of any charge by the Oregon State Association of Chiropodists.

Foot surveys were conducted at St. Joseph's parochial school and Oregon Schoel for the Deaf during November. The percentage of foot disorders found in the Salem school children corresponds with findings of a study made by the U.S. Public Health Service, in which it was found that 80 percent of the adult population is suffering, or has suffered from foot allments.

Authorities agree, it is said, that foot health education has not been given prop-er emphasis in the nation's schools. As a result both children and parents are poorly informed about matters of foot health and foot care.

A large percentage of foot difficulties seen in children is brought about by an improper knowledge of foot hygiene and

The objective of the foot surveys are aimed toward the promotion of foot health education. It is recognized that foot health is known to affect the general health, appearance and the social adjustment of
