Finally coast rivers are in good shape, and steelhead are being taken. While some rain fell on the coast yesterday, it was not enough to affect most streams. The Nestucca river is ideal at present for drift fishing. The weather is mild, and conditions are near ideal for this time of year.

Vesterday boat-drifters did very well. Most popular lures seem to be cluster eggs and the cherry bobber, with the nod going to salmon eggs as the most productive. Could be that many folks are not using the cherry bobber the way it is intended—right on the bottom, just, as its name implies, "bobbing" along. Fishing on most coast streams should be good this week-end, even if rain falls. It would take quite a bit of rain at this late date to spoil things.

USING LONGER DRIFT RODS

Numerous anglers are switching from the shorter spinning rod to the longer drift rods this season. They feel that the shorter rod will not keep their line off the fast water when they must cast across stream into a backwater. As any steel-header knows, he must keep his line high-under these conditions. If the line touches fast water, the lure will immediately be jerked downstream at a speed sure to make it undesirable to all but the craziest steelhead.

Our suggestion is to use a light drift rod, WITH a spinning reel and monofilament. Just replace the first guide with a larger spinning guide. The outfit will not be as flexible as a standard spinning rig, but it will do the work in fine style. Quite often a compromise like this, combining the best fea-tures of two techniques, can pay off in fish.

EXTENDED DUCK SEASON NOT LIKELY




