

Chico Again Finishes Strong for 70-61 Win Over Bearcats

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COAST ANGLING LOOKS GOOD

Finally coast rivers are in good shape, and steelhead are being taken. While some rain fell on the coast yesterday, it was not enough to affect most streams. The Nestucca river is ideal at present for drift fishing. The weather is mild, and conditions are near ideal for this time of year.

Yesterday boat-drifters did very well. Most popular lures seem to be cluster eggs and the cherry bobber, with the nod going to salmon eggs as the most productive. Could be that many folks are not using the cherry bobber the way it is intended—right on the bottom, just, as its name implies, "bobbing" along. Fishing on most coast streams should be good this week-end, even if rain falls. It would take quite a bit of rain at this late date to spoil things.

USING LONGER DRIFT RODS

Numerous anglers are switching from the shorter spinning rod to the longer drift rods this season. They feel that the shorter rod will not keep their line off the fast water when they must cast across stream into a backwater. As any steelheader knows, he must keep his line high-under these conditions. If the line touches fast water, the lure will immediately be jerked downstream at a speed sure to make it undesirable to all but the craziest steelhead.

Our suggestion is to use a light drift rod, WITH a spinning reel and monofilament. Just replace the first guide with a larger spinning guide. The outfit will not be as flexible as a standard spinning rig, but it will do the work in fine style. Quite often a compromise like this, combining the best features of two techniques, can pay off in fish.

EXTENDED DUCK SEASON NOT LIKELY

A call this morning to Clark Walsh, Assistant Oregon State Game Director, would indicate to us that it is doubtful if the Pacific flyway will be granted an extension on the migratory waterfowl season. A poll of the Flyway Council reveals that Washington is for the extension, California is not too interested, but will go along with the majority, while Nevada is definitely not interested. They have been having top shooting.

Thus, Oregon and Washington are the only two advocates of the extension. There is such a short time left, says Walsh, in which to effect the mechanics of the extension, even if it were granted, that he doubts that it is possible.

Another interesting comment from Clark was that the latest figures of the duck kill from Oregon's public shooting areas reveals that the total kill is only slightly under last year—though at Sauvie Island, the total kill is only half of last year's total. Thus it would indicate that Western Oregon is the section that is feeling the pinch, while other regions are providing good hunting. This simply points up the need for zoning in the future—the present situation is highly inequitable, and very discouraging to the thousands of western Oregon gunners.

Irish Suspend Guglielmi, Heap; Can Apply in Feb.

South Bend, Ind. (AP)—Quarterback Ralph Guglielmi and halfback Joe Heap, suspended by Notre Dame for breaking curfew, will be permitted to apply for re-admission in February.

The two juniors, regulars on the undefeated Irish football team this season, admitted Thursday night they had been suspended after a tardy return to the campus following a celebration of Notre Dame's 40-14 season-ending victory over Southern Methodist Dec. 5.

The week-end curfew for all students at the university is 12:30 a.m. Heap said he and Guglielmi were "about 20 minutes late."

The Rev. Theodore Hesburgh, Notre Dame president, would neither deny nor confirm the suspensions. He said the school has a strict policy against public announcements of such kind.

However, Heap told reporters at Memphis, where he attended a prep football banquet, that "it's true—Ralph and I violated a minor rule at the university and we have to accept the consequences."

"We were a little disappointed, but we'll take our medicine," Heap added. "Both of us definitely will apply to get back into school when the second semester starts in February."

Fishing Report

Portland (AP)—The report on weekend fishing conditions prepared by the State Game Commission:

Northwest: Prospects for fishing on the north coast good. Streams are clearing and lowering. Larger rivers in the Tillamook area are medium high and murky but dropping. Smaller streams are clear and in good condition. Wilson river murky at times because of logging operations. The Nestucca and Three rivers are slightly murky at present but if weather continues fair, streams should improve. Steelhead fishing fair in Lincoln county.

Southwest: Steelhead fishing has been fair on Tillamook lakes outlet and may improve. Southern coastal streams clear and dropping. Steelhead fishing is fair to good in lower Umpqua. In the upper Umpqua, steelhead angling fair but with clear weather, should improve.

Northeast: Steelhead fishing below McNary good. Limit catches have been made on large flatfish and cherry bobbers, drifting from the deadline to the mouth of the Umatilla. Bank fishing poor. Steelhead being taken on the Umatilla up to ribs on both bait and lure. Lower Umatilla and Grande Ronde rivers poor for steelhead. Roads in poor condition.

Surge Chills Local Effort, Ends Series

Willamette university faltered in the last few minutes to drop its second game in two nights to a deadeye Chico state five, 70-61, here Thursday.

The Bearcats played almost the same type of ball as Wednesday night when they lost to the same club, 73-67, maintaining the pace for the biggest part of the game only to fall apart as the curtain neared.

With about half of the fourth quarter remaining, and the score tied at 59-59 on Bill Colvard's free throw, George Madero dropped in two of his 11 charities to put Chico ahead to stay at 61-59.

Chico Pulls Away

Jerry McCallister's free throw made it 61-60 and Ron Kuhn potted a goal for Chico for a 63-60 count with four minutes remaining. Dave Gray accounted for Willamette's final point with a free throw but from then on it was Madero's deadly in the clutch.

The 6-1 center then hit for one basket and four free throws as the Bearcats cooled off and desperately tried to regain possession of the ball.

The first half was a rather hectic affair with both teams having hot spurts. In the first quarter, the Bearcats spotted Chico a 15-5 lead and then closed the gap to 18-15 in favor of Chico State at the end of the period.

Dropping behind 28-21 in the second quarter, Willamette closed the gap as close as 28-30 before the Wildcats opened it to 36-32 at the half on baskets by Pierce and Madero.

Lead Changes Often

The see-saw third period saw the lead changing hands six times and being tied six more times. It ended with the Wildcats holding a slim 53-52 advantage.

The Staters again were led by their center, Madero, who got 23 points. Madero was named to the Little All-Coast team last season at an end position despite the fact he weighs only 175 pounds.

The Bearcats were paced by Guard McCallister, who got only on bucket in the first half but came back to end with 13. Pete Reed wound up with 12, as did Center Tom Gooding.

In the last contest before Santa comes, the Bearcats will travel to Monmouth Saturday night to tangle with Oregon College of Education.

After Christmas, Willamette will open a two-game series in Salem January 1-2 against Central Washington.

Pre-conference basketball action in the Northern Division shifts to high gear this week-end with four of the league's five clubs tackling nationally rated powers.

The Oregon State Beavers, picked by many to capture the bunting won by Washington last year, draws the toughest assignment. But Oregon, Washington State, Washington and Idaho also have their work cut out for them.

The Beavers play Indiana, defending NCAA champion and the No. 1 team in the latest Associated Press poll, Monday and Tuesday nights. Even a split could boost their No. 11 rating in the poll that gave the Hoosiers the top spot.

The games will be part of twin bills at Corvallis and Eugene, respectively, which also will feature collisions between Oregon and the Nebraska Cornhuskers.

Oregon State will be the first to test the Cornhuskers, in a single game at Corvallis Saturday night.

Another Midwest invader, 24th-ranked Kansas State, moves to Seattle to open the week-end with a Friday-Saturday series against Washington. The same nights the touring Washington State Cougars tangle with 15th-ranked California at Berkeley.

Idaho will be host to Loyola of Los Angeles Saturday night. Going into the week-end — Oregon, Idaho and OSC were unbeaten. Washington State has won five and lost two and Washington dropped its only two games to Stanford. Washington State was handed its second loss Thursday night.
