## Jones Talks on **Pool System**

Increasing costs of higher education make it important for Oregon to take advantage of the new system under which Western states pool their graduate school resources, Dr. William C. Jones, Eugene, exec-utive director of the Western Commission for Higher Edu-

cation, said here Friday.

Dr. Jones spoke to 50 administrators of state and private colleges and public officials. Eight states now are in the program, under which the states open up their graduate schools to students from the other states. They are Arizona, Mexico, Oregon, Idaho, Utah, Montana, Wyoming and

"It is necessary," Jones said. "for each state to develop those graduate schools for which it possesses advantages, and to stay out of the fields in which other states have advantages."

Jones said the meeting was "trial balloon," being the being the first of several meetings to be held in each state in the com-
