Orange Coffee Cake*
Ingredients: 2 cups biscuit mix, 1 tablespoon grated orange rind, 1/4 teaspoon mace, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1/4 cup milk, 1/4 cup fresh orange juice, 1 egg (well beaten), 2 tablespoons butter or margarine (melted), 6 large or 12 small lumps of sugar, 1/4 teaspoon mace, 1 1/2 teaspoons grated orange rind, 1 tablespoon fresh orange juice.

Method: Mix biscuit mix, 1/4 teaspoon mace and 2 tablespoons sugar. Stir in milk, 1/4 cup orange juice, egg and butter just until dry ingredients are moistened. Spoon into paper baking cups placed in 12 medium-size muffin pans, filling cups two-thirds full. Place 1/4 large or whole small lump of sugar in center of each muffin. Mix 1/4 teaspoon mace, 1 1/2 teaspoons orange rind and 1 tablespoon orange juice drizzle 1/4 teaspoon over each sugar lump. Bake in moderate (375°F.) oven 20 to 25 minutes.
