DEATH DETOURED THIS CRASH BY INCHES



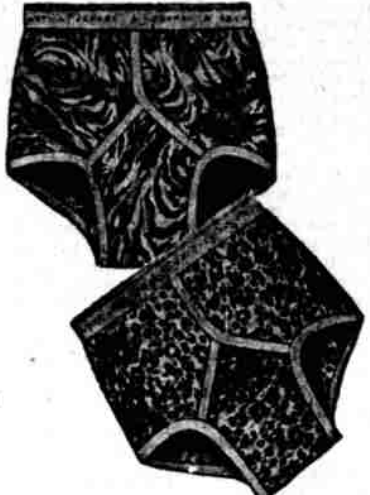

Accidents Result in Death of 2 Husbands

Waco, Tex. (AP) — A young mother of three lay seriously ill in a hospital here today, widowed by accident the second time in 18 months.

Mrs. Fay Little's husband Truman, 25, was fatally injured yesterday in a traffic accident after visiting his wife at the hospital. She had become ill last week. Her first husband was killed in a tractor accident. Her three children by that marriage are being cared for by her father.

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Freight Train Rams Auto, Four Killed

Knoxville, Tenn. (AP) — A long freight train slammed into an automobile on a grade crossing here yesterday, killing four young people and bouncing the wreckage across a signal post 500 feet down the track. The train was not derailed.

The dead were identified as Jack Asbury, 21, and Roger Lynch, 19, both of Knoxville; Joanne Prater, 17, Powell, Tenn.; and Nora Hackworth, 18, Clinton, Tenn.

Great Falls, Mont. (AP) — Virgil Eckstein left his small son and daughter in the cab of his pickup truck while he went into a grocery store at Shelby. When he came out he found his daughter Pamela, 4, on the floor, a bullet wound in her head. She died later in a hospital.

Police have not yet determined where the .22-caliber bullet came from but Coroner Robert Burns said it may have come from some distance.
