(Continued from Page 1) In reply to questions Monday, Hagerty said the decision to give the Democrats a preview of the State of the Union message had nothing to do with any such criticism.

Long Contemplated — "This is a step which has been contemplated by the President all along," Hagerty said. Eisenhower himself said last month that he intended to consult with the Democrats at some point after discussing the forthcoming program with Republican leaders.

The bi-partisan conference announced Monday will be held at the White House at 10:30 a.m., EST, Jan. 5. Hagerty said that while the President will discuss the State of the Union message generally with the legislators, the emphasis will be on the foreign affairs and national defense aspects of the document.

"Those are two subjects," Hagerty added, "which are of vital importance to everyone in this country."

(Continued from Page 1) His ten-year record at the Whiting corporation brought his rise from chief engineer of the Stoker division to director of engineering of the division, to director of research and development, to plant manager, and to vice president in charge of manufacturing.

Long Service Record — Following his graduation from Washington State in 1916, he was in instructor and assistant professor of mechanical engineering and member of the engineering experiment staff of the college. He was an apprentice instructor at the Puget Sound navy yard at Bremerton in 1918-19 and two years before that was with the naval ordnance division at the navy yard.

Dr. Pearl taught at Benson Polytechnic school in Portland as head of the gas and aviation division. He was there from 1926 to 1932. A year prior to that he owned and operated a business in Portland.

In his tenure at Washington State college since 1946 he has been director of industrial research and chairman of the mechanical engineering department. He has done research work at the Bonneville administration which he will not direct.

Long Career Listed — He was born in Kent, Wash., October 2, 1893. He graduated from Washington State in 1916 with a degree of bachelor of science and obtained his master's degree there in 1926. From the University of Michigan in 1934 he gained his Ph.D. In addition he has taken special courses in X-ray, aviation and management.

Dr. Pearl is a member of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers and the American Society for Engineering Education. He holds four United States patents and has written many technical articles for magazines and periodicals. He is a member of Tau Beta Sigma, Phi Kappa Phi, Sigma Xi, and Phi Eta Sigma. He is a member of the Congregational church, Masons, Eastern Star and his local Chamber of Commerce. He is married and has one child.
