Smoked Tongue

Mincedmeat Loaf Beverage
Mincedmeat Loaf

Ingredients: 2 cups sifted flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 1 teaspoon salt, 1 egg (beaten), 1/2 cup milk, 1/2 cup light brown sugar (firmly packed), 3 tablespoons butter or margarine (melted), 1 cup moist mincedmeat.

Method: Sift together flour, baking powder and salt. Mix together egg, milk, brown sugar, melted butter and mincedmeat. Add to dry ingredients, stirring only enough to moisten. Pour into greased loaf pan (8 1/2 x 4 1/2 x 2 1/2 inches). Bake in moderate (350°) oven 1 hour or until cake tester inserted in center comes out clean. Remove from pan; cool on rack. Store 24 hours before using. Slice thin and spread with butter or cream cheese.
