





Dallas, Tex. 0.5 - The 1954 Cotton Bowl game seemed certain today to go down in football history as "bench tackle" game.

Rice Institute took the victory, 28 to 6, over Alabama yesterday, but Alabama full-back Tommy Lewis provided the strangest play of the sea-son when he came off the bench to stop Rice's Dickie Moegle with a 12th man tackle.

Lewis of course, had no business on the field and a touchdown was awarded to Rice as a result. Actually, Moegle had already scam-pered 57 yards when Lewis nailed him on the Alabama 38 yard line and probably would have gone all the way for a 95 yard touchdown run.

"I saw him coming a long way off," said Lewis in a statement issued for him after the game. "The nearer he got to me, the nearer I moved to the field."
