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His address evoked questioning comment from some of the Democrats called in for the briefing session.

Rep. McCormack (D-Mass), whip or assistant Democratic leader in the House, was one of those attending. Commenting on the President's speech, he said Monday night that Eisenhower "apparently is fearful of a business recession."

Another of Tuesday's White House guests, Sen. Lyndon B. Johnson (D-Tex), Democratic leader in the Senate, had hit the same subject from a different angle. He said it was "very good to know that the administration has adopted what has always been a Democratic policy—the belief that our people need not suffer from a 'boom or bust America'."

Eisenhower himself filled in the conferees on sections of his message which he will deliver in person to Congress Thursday.

Recovered in

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While the troopers said the "bulk" of the money was recovered, there was a report here that only about half of it had been located.

Virginia officers said a Treasury employee was suspected of the unprecedented theft from the tightly guarded engraving building.

The trooper said the farm where the money was found was owned by a relative of one of the suspects.

The Virginia troopers said the first tip on the whereabouts of the money came to the state police.

Since the Secret Service took charge of the money and the case, the Virginia troopers were without definite information as to the amount recovered or developments in the wake of the recovery.

The missing money was in 8,000 crisp, new ready-to-spend \$20 bills. Somehow, someone sneaked it out of the bureau during the New Year's holiday period, leaving two packages stuffed with plain white paper where the money was supposed to be in a vault.

Ax Marks of Century Ago In Old Church

House wreckers dismantling Salem's first Episcopal church, erected at the southwest corner of Church and Chemeketa streets in 1854, have discovered that laths used to carry the old lime plaster were hand made strips split from western red cedar logs.

Corner posts for wall support bear broadaxe marks made when the timbers were hewed about 190 years ago. Siding, presumed to be the original, was cut from small logs without too much regard for knots. Large logs could not be successfully handled in local sawmills of a century ago.
