

# Senior Bowl to Feature Passes Against Running

MOBILE, Ala. (AP)—The Senior Bowl football game here Saturday looks as a match between the passing wizardry of Steve Owen's South squad and the running attack of Paul Brown's Northerners.

The accurate right arms of Georgia's Zeke Bratkowski and Virginia, Vince Dooley of Auburn and Jim Gray of East Texas Teachers have established the South as a 7-point favorite. The trio will aim their tosses principally at Dreher Gas-

kin of Clemson and Dave Davis of Georgia Tech, 6 feet 4 ends.

In the North camp, the accent has been on running, with Brown trying out two potent combinations. One has Northwestern's Dick Thomas at quarterback, Michigan State's Billy Wells and Villanova's Gene Filippi at the halfback positions, and West Virginia's Tom Allman at fullback.

In the other, Fordham's Roger Franz directs UCLA's Bill Stits and Wisconsin's Harland Carl at halfback and Maryland's Ralph Felton

at fullback.

But observers aren't counting on the North's passing or the South's running.

And no matter what type attacks are used each team will have plenty of up-front talent to rely on.

In addition to Don Dohoney of Michigan State, All America line-man for the North are tackle George Jacoby of Ohio State and center Jerry Hilgenberg of Iowa. The South's All America linemen are two guards, Crawford Mims of Mississippi and J. D. Roberts of

# Heart Attack Claims Rabbit Maranville, 61

NEW YORK (AP)—Walter (Rabbit) Maranville, rated as one of the greatest fielding shortstops in baseball history and a member of the 1914 "miracle" Boston Braves, died last night of a heart attack. He was 61.

Death came to the little man, who started his major league career with the Boston Braves in 1912 and wound up with the same club in 1935, at his home in the Woodside section of New York.

Burial will be at Springfield, Mass. He is survived by his widow Helene and a daughter, Mrs. Peter McGuinis of Rochester, N. Y.

In between the times he played with the Braves, he was a member of the Pittsburgh Pirates, Chicago Cubs, Brooklyn Dodgers and the St. Louis Cardinals. And he managed the Cubs briefly during the 1925 season and piloted the Braves, also for a short period, in 1929.

After breaking a leg in a 1934 spring exhibition game with the New York Yankees, the Rabbit wound up his major league career the following year. But before bowing out of baseball altogether he took a fling at managing El-

mira, N.Y., and Montreal in the International League.

In later years, he had been active in baseball as director of the New York Journal-American's sandlot program.
