

Salem High to Play Roosevelt Friday at Portland

Wulf Holds Point Lead For Vikings

Salem high travels to Portland Friday for a return clash with the Roosevelt Teddies. The Vikings, coached by Harold Hauk, will be after win number five after they dropped Tuesday's game to the strong Milwaukie Mustangs 75-63 for their first loss of the season.

Earlier in the season the Vikings edged the Portland club 50-46 at Salem high and then Salem went on to win three straight. Roosevelt was beaten by 29 points when they played Milwaukie.

The Teddies are paced by their driving guard Rich Curtis and forward Dave Wanaka. The other probable starters for Roosevelt are Charles Geldaker at center, Bill Witala at guard, and Dennis Rodin at forward.

Wulf Leads Statistics
Salem's starting line-up will probably be Jim Knapp and Gordy Domogalla at guards, Bob Wulf at center and Tom Pickens and Larry Springer at the forwards. Wulf has jumped into the lead in Salem individual scoring as the 6-4 junior has 23 field goals and 17 free throws for 83 points. He took only 43 shots from the floor to give him a field goal average .335.

Jim Knapp is close behind Wulf with 23 field goals and 11 free throws for 57 points while Tom Pickens has 54 to take third spot. In all the Vikings have taken 338 shots and made 119 for a .352 average. They have scored 324 points to their opponents 296.

The junior varsity game matches Lee Gustafson's unbeaten Salem JV's and the Roosevelt junior varsity. Salem will be after its sixth straight win and they have run up 287 points to their opposition's 181. Don Zeh leads them in scoring with 40 points while Bob Tom has 35 and Marv Rhine has 34.
