

Treasury Acts To Stop Thefts

Washington (UP) — Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey took action today to see that thieves won't be able again to haul large bundles of greenbacks away from the government's money printing plant.

He ordered Secret Service Chief U. E. Baughman to make a "prompt and thorough" investigation to see that the Bureau of Engraving and Printing is enforcing its security rules.

He also called for recommendations on ways to prevent any more thefts like the one New Year's Eve when \$160,000 in crisp, new \$20 bills were stolen from the bureau.

Six persons have been arrested in connection with the theft and all but about \$31,000 of the loot has been recovered.

A roundup of the announced suspects in the theft was completed last night when Roger Patterson of nearby Brentwood, Md., cousin of the man charged with engineering the theft, walked into a Washington police station and said "somebody's looking for me."

\$552,000 Aid For Hospitals

PORTLAND (UP) — Oregon will get \$552,000 in federal aid for hospital construction in 1954, Dr. Harold Erickson, state health officer, announced Wednesday.

He said the money is to go to projects in Heppner, Gold Beach, Springfield, St. Helens and Portland. About 12 other communities also are interested in applying for federal aid, he said.

Since 1947, the federal government has participated in hospital projects, paying up to a third of the cost. This has enabled Oregon hospitals to add 1,900 beds in that period, Erickson said.

Old Timers At Rotary

Three men whose combined endeavors in as many different fields total more than 150 years, and a fourth who is a comparative "youngster" in his profession, spoke of their experiences during Wednesday's Rotary club program. All four men are Rotarians.

Smith said he started in the insurance business because he needed a job. He feels that it plays an important part in the economy of the country, but admitted that it takes long hours and lots of work to start from scratch and make a success.

Rev. Moore, probably the only one of the quartet who deliberately entered his particular field "because of an inner compulsion," started to become an architect. He said he considered it a "wonderful privilege" to be associated with people during their times of joy and sorrow.

Charles Fowler, also a Rotarian, was responsible for the program which the membership apparently decided was well worth while.

Imlah's Attorney Files an Appeal

HOOD RIVER, (UP) — The attorney for Donald D. Imlah, 18-year-old youth scheduled to be executed in the state prison gas chamber Feb. 23, has entered a motion to set aside a first-degree murder judgment by a jury.

The attorney seeks a new trial on the basis of court "irregularities." The jury brought forth a verdict of guilty without leniency on Dec. 12 before Circuit Judge Malcolm Wilkinson.
