DeGasperi Really Won Reelection Last June

New York (AP)—Italian Premier Alcide De Gasperi actually won reelection in last June's election but conceded defeat on the basis of a preliminary vote count and Communist claims that 1,300,000 challenged votes were mostly Communist, the New York Herald Tribune said today.
 The newspaper said information reaching Washington showed conclusively that De Gasperi received more than 52 per cent of the popular vote on a recount of the challenged ballots.
 The information showed that 70 Communist and pro-Communist members of the Chamber of Deputies have no legal claim to their seats.
 But it was indicated the De Gasperi victory probably never will be recognized, the newspaper said. After the actual results became apparent the Elections Commission slowed down its recount process to four votes a day and may never report conclusive findings to the Chamber of Deputies.
 The original vote count showed De Gasperi's coalition received only 49 per cent of the popular vote while Communist factions received 37 per cent.
 In addition, Communists challenged 1,300,000 ballots which were recounted and De Gasperi, before the recount started, assumed that most of the challenged votes were pro-Communist, as the Communists claimed.
 De Gasperi was succeeded by Premier Giuseppe Pella and the Communists took control of the Chamber of Deputies.
 The Herald Tribune said the results of the recount and De Gasperi's legal title to the premiership were admitted privately but denied publicly by every politician in Rome.
