WOODBURN — An ordinance was introduced at the Woodburn City Council meeting this week making it mandatory for ownmaking it mandatory for owners of premises or buildings within 100 feet of a Woodburn city sewer to connect with the municipal sewer systems bemunicipal sewer systems bemunic

Anyone could lay the tile from the building to the sewer and bypass the septic tank but all such work would have to be inspected by a licensed plumber or an inspector designated by the council. A signed statement would have to be filed with the city recorder and a \$1 inspection fee paid if the services of a city inspector were used. inspector were used.

The ordinance provides that the city may abate the nuisance of the use of outhouses, cess pools and septic tanks if the property owner does not comply within 30 days after written notice by the city.
