Paul Carmichael said that at Dallas remarks were heard that "the only time we go to Salem to buy is when we can't get it anywhere else." That, he said, was the attitude in other cities of the valley.

Jason Lee urged a fair sampling of public opinion. He stressed increased hazards to pedestrians at street intersections.

Don Madison mentioned three service stations that he said had been put out of business by the grid system. Representing several women who were present, Mrs. L. C. Marshall spoke against the grid system, and Frank Ward said it had slowed up delivery service from his place of business.

Jack Hazelett said the whole question was "Is it beneficial?" and that in answering that both the public and the business men had to be considered. Andy Foster, president of the Salem Downtown Merchants association, said that he didn't like the grid system, but added that he was speaking only for himself.

About two dozen men and women attended the meeting.

Rep. Chauncey W. Reed (R-Ill), chairman of the House Judiciary Committee which would have to handle the problem, said: "How can you take citizenship from a man born here? It can't be done."

County Building

County Clerk Henry C. Mattson plans to move a quantity of election materials into basement storage of the new courthouse during the next few weeks. In addition a considerable quantity

of records will be shifted. Movement of the records at this time will permit the shift before the tile flooring is laid in the corridors, thus eliminating possibility of damage.

The county court effected a saving of some \$1000 in connection with the construction of the new building when it signed an order Friday morning eliminating several coats of paint from the walls of storage space. The walls will be given a coating of waterproof paint which is considered sufficient.

Hallinan Enters McNeill Island

McNEILL ISLAND, Wash. (AP)—For the second time in two years, federal prison gates slammed Thursday behind Vincent Hallinan, the Progressive Party's candidate for President in 1952.

Hallinan, San Francisco attorney who defended Harry Bridges during the longshore leader's perjury-conspiracy trial, entered the federal penitentiary here to begin serving an 18-month term for evading \$30,000 income taxes.

It was the second "visit" here of the tall, nattily dressed attorney but the greeting he received was nothing like the send-off he was given when he completed his first sentence a year and a half ago.

Death Summons G. Max Flanery

G. Max Flanery, who for many years was an employe of the state of Oregon and from 1943 until ill health forced his retirement in January, 1952, as assistant public utilities commissioner, died early Friday morning at his home at 565 North 24th street.

Flanery was born November 21, 1896, at Perrydale, Oregon. He attended Oregon State college and was a veteran of World War I.

In 1923 Flanery joined the state traffic force and was with the force until 1931. At this time he became assistant manager of the motor vehicle department in the office of secretary of state, a position he held until 1943, when he was named assistant public utilities commissioner.

Flanery was a member of the Masonic Amity Lodge No. 20, A.F. and A.M.; Salem Lodge No. 338, B.P.O.E.; Capital Post No. 9, American Legion, and the Forty and Eight.

His wife, the former Carrie E. Boudry to whom he was married October 4, 1925, survives him.

Funeral services will be held Monday, January 11, at 1:30 p.m. at the Clough-Barrick chapel with Rev. Donald Payne officiating. Private committal services will be at the Mt. Crest Abbey mausoleum and crematorium.

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
