**Fry-Cook Almond Rice**  
Ingredients: 25 almonds, 1/2 cup butter or margarine, 1 cup uncooked rice, 1/2 cup finely chopped onion, 1 cup diced green pepper, 1 1/2 teaspoons salt, 2 1/2 cups water.

Method: Blanch almonds by covering with water and heating to boiling; drain at once and slip off skins. Split almonds in half lengthwise; dry on towel. Melt butter in 10-inch skillet that has a tight cover. Add almonds, rice and onion; cook over moderately low heat, stirring often, until rice is browned and onions yellowed. Stir in green pepper, salt and water. Bring to vigorous boil. Turn heat as low as possible. Cover and leave over this low heat 20 minutes or until rice is tender. Uncovers and stir over low heat a few minutes. Serve at once. Makes 6 servings.

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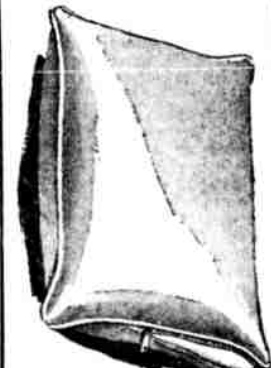
