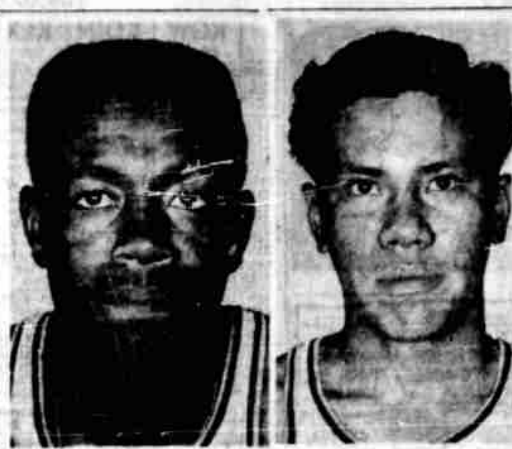

He is R. C. Owens, a 6-foot-3 whiz who has said his goal is to play with the Harlem Globetrotters. With his springy legs and assortment of shots and passes, he is averaging 22.2 points and is leading the nation's small colleges (NAIA) in rebound recoveries, 26.1 per game. The sophomore was all-Northwest conference center last year and for two seasons was all-star first team end in the Coyotes' football fortunes.

As a team the Coyotes are averaging 77.6 points per game compared to 63.7 for 10 opponents. They have won six of eight pre-conference contests but split their two conference openers with the surprising Linfield club, 64-66 and 76-60.

George Makini, freshman stand-out, is hitting .463 from the outside and senior guard Dick Carrow is hitting .437 giving the Coyotes three starters dropping them at .435 or better.

Completing the first five are Ray Mullins, a former Emmett, Idaho, and Boise junior college ace, and Dick Spiess, well-known around the circuit. That means that Mullins will be playing against another ex-Boise Juco player, Tom Gooding of Willamette.

Also traveling with Coach Sam Vokes' crew are Gene Sirehlo, Dick Zury, Ken Hopper, Dick Hahn, Ben Kerfoot, Max Sanchez, Harvey Whitten, Don Hamblin and Bill Kundrat. Sanchez also played with Boise High and Boise Juco.
