OSC's 7-foot 3-inch center Swede Halbrook netted 60 points in the two games with Idaho, boosting his season shooting average from 23.7



# Huntington Tells SBC Of Old Days

Football teams aren't conditioned as well as they used to be when nearly every starter played the whole game, Holly Huntington told the Salem Breakfast club this

The speaker, who played every minute of three Rose Bowl games in 1917, 1918 and 1920, referred to the bowl teams coached by Hugh Bezdek at Oregon in the season of 1916 and at Mare Island in 1917.

Was "Vicious" Team

The 1916 Oregon team he described as "the roughest, toughest, fastest, most vicious team I est, tastest, most vicious team I was ever with and none before or since could touch it. Bezdek has everyone snarling, practiced us for hours." Most of them were from 25 to 29 years old and "outconditioned" Pennsylvania, which had four All-Americans, in the 1917 Rose Bowl, 14-0.

Huntington told the Senator ho Huntington told the Senator hotel audience that clipping was legal in those days and kept a player on the alert. His brother, Shy Huntington, also was in the backfield for Oregon and coached the 1920 bowl team which lost to Harvard, 7-6.

In the Marine Corps next year at Mare Island Huntington was given a choice of being shipped out to Manchuria or of playing football. He chose football and "behind a tremendous line" beat all opponents by 25 to 30 points, taking Camp Lewis in the 1911 bowl 19-7.
