Linn Library Ballot Sought

ALBANY — When told that it would be impossible for the Linn county court to budget sufficient funds to inaugurate a Linn county library, members of the Linn County Mobile Library committee started work immediately Monday on the preparation of initiative petitions placing the decision with the voters at the November 2 general election.

The court was formally requested Monday by a committee composed of Mrs. Floyd Edwards, Riverside; Mrs. Arthur E. Krivier, representing Mill City; Mrs. Ray Ross and Mrs. W. K. Mackie of Tangent and Leo Metcalf of Albany to appropriate \$37,500 for establishment of a county library, involving a tax levy of slightly less than .5 of a mill.

Speaking for the court County Judge E. G. Arnold told the group that such an appropriation could not be made within the 5 per cent limitation imposed by law, and would therefore probably require a vote on the budget if the request should be granted.

Public Power Advocates Asked to Co-operate

MIAMI — Asst. Secretary of the Interior Fred G. Aandahl said Tuesday "crusaders for a federal power monopoly" are trying to use rural electric cooperatives and their associations to gain his end.

Aandahl defended the Eisenhower administration's power policy in a speech prepared for the annual convention of the National Rural Electric Cooperatives Assn.

He linked the organization's own executive manager, Clyde T. Ellis, to those whose opinions he said "certainly point in the direction of a strong trend toward federal monopoly of the electric power business."

Aandahl told the co-op representatives: "I am deeply disturbed when I see those who even at this early stage are crusaders for a federal power monopoly try to use the rural electric cooperatives and their associations to foster federal monopoly."

"It is my suggestion and request that you work cooperatively with us in a more reasonable program of federal power built around such amounts as come logically with wise water resource development."

The new power policy, announced last Aug. 18, states in part that "the primary responsibility for supplying power needs of the area rests with the people locally."

It has been bitterly criticized by Ellis and at regional meetings of cooperative officials it also has been explored at Senate and House committee hearings.

Aandahl explained that under this new policy, the Interior Department will emphasize new hydroelectric developments that are beyond the financial means of state and local bodies and private enterprise.

The policy, he continued, "recognizes that the federal government is now supplying only about 12 per cent of the nation's electric power and that any attempt to create a federal monopoly or drive out local private or public enterprise is contrary to proven American standards and a hazard to the economic prosperity of the people."

"The new power policy is bringing wholesome results."

Aandahl praised the rural electrification program as "one of the very best ventures of our federal government."

More Than 100 Dead or Missing in Avalanche

VIENNA, Austria — More than 100 persons are dead or missing in a major avalanche disaster in the Vorarlberg region of Austria, police at Bregenz reported Tuesday.

The toll was announced as other vast snowslides throughout central Europe's mountainland claimed at least 23 dead and 44 missing.

The avalanches roaring down the Alps severed communications and isolated hundreds of villages. Officials said it might be days before the full toll is known.

Police said that more than 50 of the victims of the Vorarlberg disaster were missing in the village of Bions. Twenty three houses in the town, in the great Wauser Valley near the Swiss frontier, were covered by a huge series of snowslides Monday.

The avalanches blocked the small Lutzbach River and many of the missing were feared drowned in the dammed-up waters.

The other 30 persons listed as dead or missing were from scattered villages in Vorarlberg Province, police said. The reports indicated that the sudden avalanches may add up to the nation's worst snow disaster. Only three years ago more than 124 people were buried alive in a similar catastrophe.

The threat appeared to be mounting throughout most of the mountain area. Rising temperatures were melting the snow, bringing the danger of fresh disasters.

The slides — ancient foes of Europe's hardy mountain folk — cut a wide swathe of death and destruction through tiny picture postcard villages in the Austrian Tyrol, the Bavarian Alps, Northern Italy and Switzerland.

Thousands of foreign tourists and winter sports fans were isolated.

Dr. Pearl Gets Briefing on BPA

PORTLAND — No "drastic changes" are planned for the Bonneville Power Administration, William A. Pearl who soon will become its director, said Monday.

But he told a press conference he would prefer not to discuss power policies or programs until he has conferred with his "superiors in Washington."

Pearl will become administrator next Friday, succeeding Paul J. Raver who is resigning to direct Seattle City Light.

Questions on power were referred by Pearl to Raver, who said that by 1959 there probably will not be any new power for heavy industries or private utilities.

Raver said the power shortage will be eased, though, if private utilities begin construction within five or six years on dams which they have planned.

Raver added that he thinks the government will have to provide some funds for new dams under the Eisenhower administration's "partnership" program.

Big Four Site Still Argued

BERLIN — The continuing deadlock between representatives of the three Western powers and the Russians over a site for the projected Big Four foreign ministers meeting raised Allied concern Tuesday as to whether the conference would come off at all.

The failure of the talks between the four Berlin commandants on arrangements to produce any results thus far posed a genuine threat to the scheduled Jan. 25 opening of the big parley, some Western sources said.

The third meeting of the four commandants wound up early Tuesday morning after 11 hours of fruitless talk. The West maintained its position that at least three — fourths of the ministers' meetings would have to be held in the Allied control authority building in the U.S. sector of the four-power city. The Russians stubbornly insisted on a bigger share to be conducted in their sector.

Cordon to Aid Potato Growers

WASHINGTON — Sen. Cordon (R-Ore.) Tuesday he was supporting a program which would aid the potato market by applying to potatoes a purchase provision now applicable to surplus pears and other products.

The potato assistance measure is being written into a cotton acreage allotment bill. Under it, potato surpluses would be bought for diversion to school lunches and other purposes.

Cordon said he had been advised that Northwest potato growers favored the proposal.
