Maple Candied Walnuts

Maple Candied Walnuts
Ingredients: 1 cup sugar 1 tablespoon light corn syrup, 1/2 cup water, 1/2 teaspoon salt, few drops maple flavoring, 1 tablespoon butter or margarine, 2 cups walnut halves.

Method: Mix sugar, corn syrup, water and salt in heavy saucepan, stir over low heat until sugar is dissolved. Boil to 238 F., or until a half-teaspoonful of the candy forms a soft ball in cold water. Remove from heat; blend in maple flavoring and butter. Add walnuts; stir gently until mixture becomes creamy. Turn out onto waxed paper and separate nuts. Makes about 1 pound.
