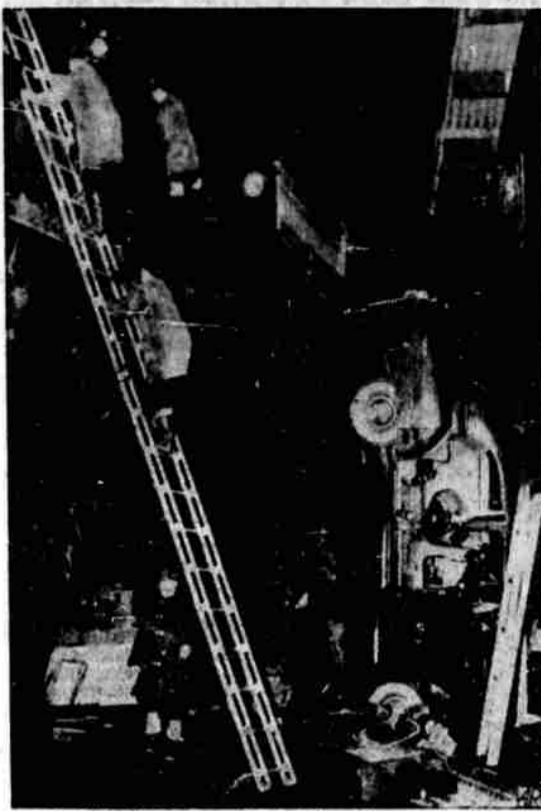


ONE POINT LANDING

New Book Will Benefit CARE

A northwest writer who experienced the terror and destruction of war when she was a prisoner of the Japanese, is determined to do all she can to alleviate the sufferings of war victims.

She is Alice Franklin Bryant, who was one of the half-starved prisoners liberated from Santa Tomas and who—in 1951—used her war indemnity compensation to purchase materials for a community house in Hiroshima.

Now she is going to lecture for the benefit of CARE; organizations for which she speaks will make out checks to CARE for food parcels to be given to hungry Koreans. And all royalties from her book "Religion for the Hardheaded," recently published by Dodd, Mead and Company, will be given to the American Friends' Service Committee for relief work in Korea.

Of the book Mrs. Bryant says: "I tried to write a brief volume that would be not only clear and meaty, but also entertaining. So I put it in the form of a down-to-brass-tacks conversation between Believer, who expresses my viewpoint; Hardhead, who thinks that seeing is believing; Agnostic, who has great faith in science; and Skeptic, who has faith in nothing. It is a good book to give to your irreligious friends."

Mrs. Bryant has related her war experiences of hiding in the Philippine jungle and of capture and imprisonment in her book, "The Sun Was Darkened."

William Cheney Bryant, her husband, was for many years a provincial governor in the Philippines and later a coconut planter. Since their repatriation in 1945 they have lived in Seattle, Washington. They have a daughter, a son-in-law who is a veteran of the Korean war, and two baby granddaughters.

automobiles in the high school curriculum. It was estimated that such a course would cost the district no less than \$25,000 for the instruction of sophomores alone.

Storage Space Among Needs of School District

The Salem school district has kept space with the demand for classrooms, brought about by a growing population, but now it finds itself seeking additional storage space.

Not entirely unlike the housewife who has accumulated a miscellany of objects and is fearful of discarding any of it, the school board has in its possession a wide variety of articles which might prove useful.

So, during Tuesday night's meeting of the directors, the decision was reached to expand the second floor space of the warehouse at Ferry and 13th streets. Upon the recommendation of Director Harry Scott, used materials will be used as much as possible. He said dimension timbers from the old cannery being razed nearby could be secured. The work will be done by the district's maintenance crew.

The need for warehouse space will become acute when the district is forced to abandon its present quarters in the old high school building. Two frame shop buildings located there also contain quantities of materials that must be saved.

Superintendent Walter Snyder reported concerning the salvaging of furniture from the present administration building for use in the new building now in course of construction at Ferry and 13th streets. He said virtually all of it could be used at the new location, but added that new equipment for seven rooms including the one to be used by the directors.

It is probable this new equipment will be purchased at the time furnishings are bought for the new South Salem high school. Samples of classroom and office equipment have arrived and they will be viewed by teachers and directors during the January 18-21 period.

Bids will be called for the renovation of the Leslie junior high school stage. The auditorium and stage will be used by

students of the South Salem high school. It is estimated the cost will be between \$7000 and \$10,000. An inspection of the stage by the buildings and grounds committee revealed that the cyclorama, the lighting and front curtain are in poor condition.

While no official action was taken since the matter was not brought to their attention from an outside source, the directors voiced opposition to the inclusion of a course in learning to drive
