

Powerful Corvallis Slaps Salem Vikings, 52-38, in Big Six

Tall Gambee Scores 22 Spartan Points

The Corvallis Spartans, led by 6-7 Dave Gambee with 22 points, defeated the Salem high Vikings 52-38 at Corvallis last night for the first Viking loss in Big Six play. The Spartans led almost from the very start to grab the win.

Salem fell behind at the start as Gambee made a free throw and Crawford had a field goal for a 3-0 lead. Salem bounced back to hold the lead for several minutes but fell back again at the end of the first quarter.

The Spartans led 12-10 with one quarter gone although they had but three field goals to four for the Vikings. Harold Hauk's Salem squad fell back farther in the second quarter as Corvallis scored ten points and held Salem to but four. They led 22-14 at halftime with Gambee leading with ten.

Corvallis sewed up the contest in the third quarter. The Vikings hit but one field goal and three free throws for five points while Gambee was leading his team to 16 points and a 38-19 lead.

Only in the last quarter could Salem begin a scoring drive as Salem reserves closed the Spartan gap to 14 points with a 19-point period. Herb Triplett and Wayne Erickson led the Vikings with six points apiece in the final period.

They got only slightly closer as Corvallis made 14 points. Gambee, although falling slightly below his Big Six average of 25 points a game, had the lead in rebounds along with total points. Salem hit .240.

Herb Triplett was high point man for the losing Vikings with seven, while Erickson had six. Domogalla and Wolf had five apiece, and Knapp had four. Salem shot at a .240 average and gone one-third of the rebounds.

Salem now has a 1-1 league mark. Lee Gustafson's Salem high junior varsity ran its victory string to seven straight last night as they edged the Corvallis JV's 43-41. A field goal and a free shot by Dale Jones in the last 28 seconds gave the Vikings the win. Bob Tom had a free throw at the last to make it 43-41.

Tom grabbed his point honors for the Vikings with 19 points but Jack Gambee, brother of Dave Gambee, led with 20 points. The Vikin JV's were behind 21-18 at halftime.

Salem plays Bend Friday and Saturday at Salem.

Both fielded their 1954 contracts on one hop yesterday and whipped them back into the Phillies' front office before owner Bob Carpenter could say "Sign on the dotted line."

Sees No Trouble
"I have no intention of signing that contract," said Roberts. "I'm asking quite a bit more," said Ashburn.

Carpenter said: "I don't anticipate trouble in adjusting the difference."

The St. Louis Cardinals, on the other hand, wouldn't say whether they expected trouble from their 20-game winner, left-hander Harvey Haddix, who likewise returned his unsigned contract.

"They offered me a small raise but not enough," said the 28-year-old hurler at his winter home in South Vienna, Ohio.

And Whitey Ford, who contributed 18 victories to the New York Yankees' pennant drive last year, rejected what he too called a small increase in pay, becoming the first Bronx holdout of 1954.
