

Mrs. Lord Here On January 20

The United Nations Human Rights Commission and the difficulties of drafting a covenant will be discussed Wednesday evening, January 20, in Waller Hall on the Willamette University campus.

Mrs. Oswald B. Lord, the U. S. representative on the Human Rights Commission, will speak on this subject. She succeeded Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt. Mrs. Lord has had a long and distinguished career in the field of public service. For years she has been active as a social worker, as Assistant Regional Director of the Office of Civilian Defense during World War II, and was for some time chairman of the U. S. Committee for the United Nations International Children's Emergency Fund. She was co-chairman for the National Citizens' Committee for Eisenhower-Nixon in the 1952 campaign.

Appearing on the West Coast by courtesy of the World Affairs Council of the Foreign Policy Association, Mrs. Lord is coming to Salem through the combined efforts of interested citizens in Corvallis, Eugene, and Salem who have supported the cause of informing the public on world affairs and the part played by various agencies of the United Nations.

Charles A. Sprague, former alternate delegate to the U. N. General Assembly, will introduce Mrs. Lord.

There will be no admission charge but a free will offering will be collected to meet certain financial needs.

Five Cows in One-Ton Class

Five cows out of 1583 involved in the dairy herd production test in Marion county in December were credited with more than a ton of milk each, according to figures released from the office of Ben A. Newell, county extension agent.

Of the 1583 cows tested, 267 were dry and the average milk yield was 592 pounds with 29 pounds of butterfat. Fourteen owner sampler herds had 183 cows on test.

St. Benedict's Abbey, Mt. Angel, had three Holsteins in the one ton or more group. Number 31 gave 2220 pounds of milk and 90.5 pounds of butterfat. Number 624 gave 2150 pounds of milk and Number 35 produced 2030 pounds.

Paul Thomas' Holstein of Turner gave 2260 pounds of milk and 97.2 pounds of fat. In the Mt. Angel herd of Art Schwab, No. 1, a Holstein, produced 2010 pounds of milk.

A. R. Peterson, Route 2, Woodburn, is a new member of the testing association. His 13 Jerseys averaged 35.5 pounds of fat and 632 pounds of milk for the month.

The Oregon State penitentiary has also joined the testing herds this month.

Ragwort Control Held Promising

Progress of the weed control district in Marion county was very promising according to farmers and county officials who met in Salem this week.

Judge Rex Hartley said farmers and land owners know Tansy Ragwort can be controlled now, while a few years ago many doubted it.

Many properties that were loaded with tansy ragwort 2 or 3 years ago are nearly rid of it now, says Weed Supervisor Jake Neufeldt. The greatest problem of the district according to Neufeldt, is to locate weed patches. This is not a matter of informing on a neighbor but rather one of improving the community by cleaning up a poisonous weed.

Bank Robberies At Record Height

WASHINGTON (AP)—The FBI disclosed today that bank robberies, on the upswing in recent years, rose last year to their highest level in the annals of federal crime.

The FBI made available figures which showed that during 1953, there were 418 bank robberies, burglaries and larcenies, the highest total since the passage of the federal bank robbery statute in 1934.

This total represented an increase of 27 per cent over the 1952 total.

Friday Last Day for 9- Year-Old Enrollment

January 15 is the last day for Salem boys and girls 9 years of age and older to enroll in 4-H Club work for projects exhibited at the spring show in May. James Bishop, city extension agent, reported.

Projects to be completed and exhibited at the Salem 4-H spring show May 20-22 include clothing, knitting, cooking, camp cooking, homemaking, health, woodworking, electricity and photography.
