Talk Made on Making Will

The various reasons why a person should make a will and the circumstances surrounding the drawing of such a document were detailed by John Galey, Sweet Home attorney, for the benefit of the Salem Rotary club membership Wednesday noon.

Not only should wills be drawn by virtually all adults, but it is essential that they be reviewed from time to time in order that they may fit changing circumstances, said Galey. He advised against home made wills or changing them without the advice of counsel.

The expense of drawing a will, said the speaker, quite frequently can be saved because the person involved can designate an executor thus eliminating the expense of a bond.

Galey spoke of the various circumstances that may change a will. A second marriage nullifies a will and he advised that making of a will should be a part of every marriage.

Air Academy Badly Needed

WASHINGTON (AP)—Harold E. Talbott, Air Force secretary, told Congress Wednesday there is an "immediate and, in my opinion, urgent" need for a separate air academy to help overcome a shortage of young officers.

He testified the United States is the only major power without a separate educational institution for military airmen and engineers. "This deficiency is of serious importance to our national security," he said.

Talbott appeared before the House Armed Services Committee at the start of hearings on a bill to authorize an Air Force West Point and permit initial planning. The cost is estimated at 100 million dollars.

President Eisenhower has personally endorsed the measure, Talbott testified.

The main debate on the bill is creating a new civilian board to survey possible sites, with the air secretary making the final decision. Talbott said the site is still "wide open."

Over 1000 Signed Anti-Grid Petitions

The organization of business and professional men and women who are fighting for abolition of the one-way street grid in Salem claim over 1000 names on petitions that will go before the City Council.

Petitions have been placed for signing at 36 places of business and will be available for signing until they are submitted to the City Council at the night of January 25. At that time a public hearing on the question will be held by the City Council.

The anti-grid forces have called another meeting for Friday noon of this week at the Senator Hotel, and at that time will marshal arguments that are to be made at the hearing. They are urging the people to express themselves on the question both before and at the time of the hearing.

A. W. Trimble, Mountain States president, said Albany would remain a division headquarters for the consolidated firm which will be known as Pacific Power and Light. The two firms have a total capitalization of 161 million dollars—117 million for PP&L and 44 million for Mountain States. PP&L reported its annual revenues at 22 million and Mountain States at 15 1/2 million.

PP&L owns Merwin and Yale Dams on the Lewis River in Washington and three steam generating plants. Mountain States owns 12 plants in the Pacific Northwest.

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He said Australia and New Zealand "don't look favorably on relations with Formosa," home of Nationalist Chinese. Leader Chiang Kai-Shek.

And President Rhee of South Korea, he said, is skeptical about Japan.

He said, too, the treaty does not mean that an attack on South Korea is an attack on the United States. In this way, he said, the defense treaty differs from NATO, which spells out carefully that an attack on any member is to be considered an attack on all members.

Should hostilities resume in Korea, Dulles added, there is no reason to believe they would be confined to the peninsula and there would "no longer be a privileged sanctuary." This was an expression used by Gen. Douglas MacArthur in reference to Chinese mainland bases which were safe from United Nations attack.

Oregon to Test Polio Vaccine

PORTLAND (UP)—The State Board of Health announced today it will permit testing of the new Salk polio vaccine in Oregon this year if supplies are made available by the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis.

The board voted, following last Saturday's approval by the council of the State Medical Society, to authorize the foundation to test the new vaccine on selected Oregon second-grade school children whose parents or guardians have requested the vaccination.

The proposed tests also have been approved by the state department of education.

Dr. Harold M. Erickson, state health officer, said that Oregon authorities had not been informed yet whether any areas in the state would be among those selected by the foundation for its nationwide tests, but he said he thought there was "an excellent chance."

The board, meeting in Salem yesterday, re-elected L. L. Riggs as president, Dr. D. C. Burkes of Portland as first vice president and Dr. Tom Dunham of Salem as second vice president.

Census Shows Roseburg Gain

The population of Roseburg has been increased by 2,115 through annexation of new territories since the 1950 federal census. Secretary of State Earl T. Newbury said Wednesday.

Newbury's office just completed the census of the city, which now will have a population of 10,505, as far as the state government is concerned.

The new census makes Roseburg eligible for bigger shares of state highway and liquor revenues.

Newbury also reported that St. Paul, in North Marion County, gained 42 persons through a newly annexed district, establishing a new census figure of 268 as a basis for distributing the state funds.

Eisenhower said that in making the recommendation as part of his plan for amending the Taft-Hartley act he was trying to establish a principle. He said he purposely avoided spelling out details because that is the province of Congress.

The President also:
1. Said Secretary of State Dulles was only stating a fundamental truth when he declared in a speech Tuesday night that the United States has made a basic decision to meet any future Communist aggression by relying primarily on instant massive retaliation.

2. Laughed off an effort to find out whether he intends to seek a second term. His political friends, Eisenhower added, have advised him never to deal with that subject.

3. Expressed confidence that the United States is achieving better balance in its defense forces every day.

4. Said regarding the controversial Bricker amendment on treaty making powers, that he never would subscribe to any treaty or agreement which in any way contravened the Constitution. He indicated, however, that he and Sen. Bricker (R-Ohio), chief sponsor of the proposed constitutional amendment have not been able to agree on a compromise.

5. Reported he had been advised by the Agriculture Department that it knows of no plan under consideration to sell butter and cottonseed oil to Russia. The whole matter of foreign trade is under study, the President said, and he will announce his recommendations later.

6. Declined again to give a breakdown on the 2,200 government workers he said previously had been separated from federal jobs for security reasons. He said he believes a great number of the 2,200 probably resigned even before they knew there was any derogatory information on their record.

7. Said he advocated stripping convicted Communist conspirators of U.S. citizenship because he believes a conspirator is just as guilty as anyone who actually attempts to overthrow the government by force.

8. Told the newsmen no significance should be read into the fact that he did not renew his call this year, in the State of the Union message, for revision of the McCarran-Walter immigration law. Eisenhower noted that he said in the message he would deal with some other matters in subsequent documents. He added that recommendations dealing with the immigration law have not yet been submitted to him by the government departments concerned.

9. Said there has been a lot of apprehension about the administration program to channel defense contracts into unemployment areas. Eisenhower said there particularly has been exaggeration along the line that entire contracts would go to such areas, rather than only 20 to 30 per cent of the total of individual contracts.

Hirman H. Saxton Rites at Newport

Funeral services were held at Newport Tuesday for a former Salem resident, Hirman H. Saxton, who died at his home at Newport Saturday following a heart attack. He had been ill for some time.

Saxton prior to his retirement because of ill health in 1947 had operated a hardware shop for several years at 19th and State streets. He moved to Newport after his retirement.

A native of Michigan, Saxton came to Oregon to make his home in 1904. He at one time was in the general merchandising and logging business in Toledo.

His wife, a son, one daughter, four grandchildren and one great grandchild survive.

Frank Leahy, Notre Dame's football coach, has had six undefeated seasons at that school—1941, '46, '47, '48, '49 and '53.

Members of the Industrial Accident commission and Unemployment Compensation commission will be asked by the governor to cooperate with the proposed sub-committee of the Oregon Development commission in providing all data available in the records of the two commissions pertinent to manpower and labor supply in different areas of the state.

"I propose to utilize every agency in the state that can aid in providing temporary employment that will carry the unemployed over until logging and other industry resumes in the spring," the governor said.

"Through concerted effort on the part of representatives of these agencies, together with industry in the state, I feel certain that some relief can be given to people who find themselves out of employment at this time, through no fault of their own."

The preliminary plans for an employment program were outlined by Governor Patterson to Edwin Armstrong, his administrative assistant, just before the governor flew to Boise to attend the Columbia Basin Inter-agency commission meeting in progress Wednesday. The governor said upon his return to Oregon Thursday, he will proceed to put his plan into operation, setting a time for the meeting of the Oregon Development commission, the first step in his proposed plan.

Procurement Officer On Campus 3 Days

First Lt. Thomas M. Loyd from the aviation cadet procurement team at the Portland Air Base will be on the Willamette university campus Wednesday, Thursday and Friday to confer with young men interested in the aviation cadet program.

During his stay on the campus Loyd will be at the Bearcat Cavern located in the basement of Waller hall.

To be eligible for the program young men must be between the ages of 19 and 26 1/2 years of age, have a minimum of two years of college and be able to pass the physical and mental examinations.

Monday and Tuesday of this week the lieutenant spoke to cadets of the Air Force ROTC corps at Willamette University.

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Sidney Boise Selected First Junior Citizen

Sidney A. Boise was named Salem's Junior First Citizen of 1953 at the annual banquet at the Marion hotel Tuesday night.

State Senator Richard Neuberger, giving the main address, urged young men to go into politics despite the sinister meaning so often associated with the word at present.

Nearly 150 persons were present at the Junior Chamber of Commerce-sponsored affair to see the 33-year-old Junior First Citizen honored by the presentation of the Distinguished Service award by the previous year's JFC, Otto Wilson, Jr. They award was in the form of a rotating plaque, which he will keep until the next JFC is named, and a personal plaque which he will own permanently.

Also honored at the banquet were George Huggins and Blaine Cline, who were presented "Key Man" awards for their work in the Junior Chamber in the past year. The awards were made by former winners Stanley Schofield and Burt Sturm.

Boise was selected for his honor by a committee of five leading Salem citizens on the basis of his activities in the Salem Community Chest, the First Presbyterian church and his many civic activities engaged in through the Salem Exchange Club and the Junior Chamber of Commerce.

Boise, treasurer of the Huggins insurance company and a manager of its Salem office, was president of the Exchange club, chairman or member of several Jaycee committees and member of the Board of Elders of his church. He is a member of the church Men's club, a membership committee chairman, former chairman of the Board of Deacons, a past president of the Jaycees and was co-chairman of the General Gifts division of the Community Chest drive in 1952.

In his talk, Neuberger decried the present method of political campaigning and the "immature" attitude of many Americans toward politics.

"Under the constitution, there are certain unalienable rights which include the equal rights to go into government," he stated. "But is that true when one man has \$100,000 to spend on his election campaign and another only \$5,000?"

To run for election at present, a man needs \$75,000 and his party another \$200,000 to support his campaign, he stated.

"Can a man be unprejudiced in his political actions with that kind of money being solicited to help him. Does the average housewife have the same voice with a government officer as the man who donated \$5000 to the campaign?"

"We must control the unlimited spending by candidates—as in some other nations—if we are each to have an equal chance in government," he declared. "In a recent survey, it was found that in nine out of ten cases, the largest campaign fund won the election."

Neuberger said he did not like politics himself and much preferred to write, but "If we want good government, we must get in and work for it, not leave it up to someone else or turn it over to those in whose ideas we cannot believe."

In concluding, Neuberger hoped that the young leaders of the community would go into politics and help make a better government and a profession with a proud heritage rather than a word to be used in a sinister whisper.

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
