Minute Steaks Mashed Potatoes
Green Peas Bread and Butter
Orange and Onion Ring Salad
ORANGE AND ONION RING SALAD

Ingredients: 1/4 cup salad oil, 1/4 cup evaporated milk, 2 tablespoons cider vinegar, 1 small clove garlic (peeled and slightly crushed), 1/4 teaspoon salt, 1/16 teaspoon pepper, lettuce or romaine, membrane-free round orange slices (about 1/4-inch thick), thin onion rings (soaked in cold water for about 1 hour and drained).

Method: Put oil, evaporated milk, vinegar, garlic, salt and pepper into jar that holds at least half a pint. Cover tightly and shake vigorously for about a minute. Chill. (Makes about 2 1/2 cup dressing). At serving time arrange lettuce on salad plates; top with orange and onion. Remove garlic from dressing, shake vigorously for about a minute, and spoon over salads in desired proportions.
