Adults who for one reason or another failed to learn to read during their adolescence, will continue to have the opportunity to improve their mental status through the medium of a course in connection with the adult education program.

The matter came up for consideration during Tuesday night's meeting of the board of directors. Currently the class has a membership of only four adults with the possibility of a fifth coming in. Since it takes eight "pupils" to make the course self-sustaining, it was a question of discontinuing or carrying on.

The directors felt that the district could well afford to finance the project at a cost of \$45 per term, since it is possible this amount might be lessened. The participants each pay \$5 tuition per term.
