Korea Honors Lt. Austin

TAEGU, Korea — Lt. Col. Leonard A. Wustin, Woodburn, Ore., army officer, was recently awarded the Republic of Korea Presidential Unit Citation as a member of the Army's Korean Communication zone headquarters.

In making the award of the decoration President Syngman Rhee cited the headquarters for "supporting all friendly forces in Korea and contributing to comprehensive economic and relief programs for the Republic of Korea."

Austin, executive officer in the comptroller section at the headquarters, has been in Korea since July of 1953. A graduate of Willamette University in Salem, Ore., he has been in the Army since September, 1940.

The colonel's wife makes her home in Woodburn and his parents are Mr. and Mrs. A. A. Austin of 213 Third street, Woodburn.

Plea Signed by 27 Per Cent

Ted Kuzni, assistant county engineer, and County Surveyor A. D. Graham have secured the signatures of approximately 27 per cent of the property owners involved in the plan to widen and straighten South River road from the Salem city limits to the community of Roberts, a distance of approximately three miles. The program calls for the securing of some 29 parcels of land. Two of them are approximately a half acre in size and the balance consist of smaller lots. In no instance has the property owner offered to donate land for the right-of-way. According to the present survey no houses will have to be moved. The time when work will start on the reconstruction of the road depends upon the success in securing the needed right-of-way, members of the county court reported.

JAPAN'S CABINET TRIMS BUDGET

TOKYO — Japan's cabinet Friday approved and submitted to parliament a \$2,776,000,000 budget for the fiscal year beginning April 1—approximately 76 million dollars less than the previous year.

2-Headed Babe 33 Days Old

INDIANAPOLIS — Indiana's two-headed boy, now 33 days old, was reported in satisfactory condition today and ready to leave Riley hospital whenever the parents are able to take him.

The parents, Mr. and Mrs. Cecil Hartley of near Petersburg, in southern Indiana, have said they wanted to take their son home as soon as possible. However, their family physician, Dr. Joseph W. Gilbert, insists that they move into Petersburg before bringing him home.

Their log cabin, three miles from Petersburg, has no electricity, plumbing or running water, and the back road leading to it is impassable much of the winter.

Peiping Radio

The Peiping broadcast did not say if the Reds would take back the prisoners from the pro-Red camp.

The return will begin at Wednesday. Although the Indians are awaiting replies to letters of notification sent both commands yesterday the spokesman said the tenor of the replies will make little or no difference.

Asked by a reporter if the Indians would go ahead with their plan, the spokesman said with emphasis: "It is not our plan—it is our decision."

The Indians have received no reply from either command. The United Nations is unable to accept the prisoners at any time, but the attitude of the Communists is not known. Most Allied newsmen and officers expect it to be strongly opposed.

Harvard Prof

McCarthy said that in his opinion "this is one of the most aggravated cases of contempt" that he had seen.

"To me it is inconceivable," McCarthy said, "that a university which has had the reputation it has had keeps this creature on teaching our children."

McCarthy previously had demanded that Harvard President Nathan M. Pusey fire Furry from the faculty.

"Many have died in the past and if we lose a war in the future it will be because of the lack of loyalty and the complete unavailability of people like you," McCarthy told Furry.

Furry testified he does not know anyone "who is a permanent member of the Harvard faculty who is or was a member of the Communist party."

Pressed for what he meant by a permanent faculty member, he answered he meant a professor or associated professor.

"Then McCarthy asked Furry, 'Do you know anyone connected with Harvard who is or was a member of the Communist party?'"

Furry replied: "I'm not going to answer that question."

McCarthy: "You are ordered to answer."

Furry: "I refuse, sir."

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OTTO WILSON TO HEAD THE CHEST

Directors of the Salem Community Chest elected Otto J. Wilson president of the Salem Community Chest at a board meeting held late Thursday afternoon.

Other officers named were Harold D. Robertson, first vice president; Herbert Barker, second vice president; Claude Kells, re-elected executive secretary, and Arthur B. Bates, treasurer. The officers were immediately installed by past President Joseph Dodd.

A plaque honoring the services of Edward Majek during and prior to his Chest presidency was presented to him by Dodd.

Otto Wilson, reporting as chairman of the 1953 campaign, stated that cash and pledges totalled \$119,615.97 to date with a few hundred dollars more expected. This is the largest amount the Salem Chest has ever raised.

Arthur Bates, treasurer, reported that there is now \$69,189.92 in Salem financial institutions, plus \$22,470.18 in pledges. Outlays of \$122,785.17 for the 1953-54 fiscal year were approved, including an overpayment of \$4442.49 made last September. These disbursements are conditional upon nearly all the pledges being paid.

The directors voted to make available in an advisory way the services of the secretary, Claude Kells to the forthcoming YMCA for an addition to that no one should consider pledges to this campaign as a substitute for regular Chest giving.

At the suggestion of Herbert Barker it was decided to conduct a labor-management conference, using men from the national Chest office if they are available.

The board will also sponsor visits to the Oregon Chest agencies during the coming year. President Wilson expressed the hope that the chairman of the 1954 fund campaign can be chosen early so he can have ample time to organize this effort.
