Date Set to Break Ground

Construction work on the Serra Catholic high school on a 33-acre tract of land near the juncture of Lancaster drive and D street, will be given impetus Sunday, Jan. 24, when ground-breaking ceremonies will be held at the site. Announcement of the program was made several weeks ago by the Franciscan Fathers of the Province of Santa Barbara, assisted by the Franciscan Sisters of LaCrosse, Wis. Rev. Kevin Murphy, O. F. M., member of the order is a teacher at Sacred Heart academy. Scheduled for completion next fall are a residence hall for faculty members and an eight classroom building. Later it is contemplated a chapel, administration building, science hall, gymnasium, athletic field, two 16-classroom structures and a sisters faculty house will be constructed. The entire project will cost in the neighborhood of \$2,000,000.

ALBANY, Ore. (AP)—The Rev. Stewart Baker, who pleaded guilty to assault in the beating of his 12-year-old son, has been placed on probation for one year. Pastor of the Sweet Home Church, the minister was taken into custody on the complaint of a neighbor. Police Chief Roy Clover said he had called a physician to treat the boy and remove a large splinter from his back. Clover said the boy had been beaten with a heavy stick and suffered cuts and bruises on his shoulders, arms and back.

5 Inches Snow

Worst Storm

(Continued from Page 1) Holland's repaired dikes withstood their first grueling storm test since their repair after the great floods of almost a year ago. The last of 87 big dike breaches were plugged in November. Nearly 2,000 people perished when the dikes gave way on Jan. 31 and Feb. 1 of last year. Britain's worst gales in a half century killed four people during the night and left a tattered trail of wreckage strewn from Scotland to the south coast. Winds whipping along up to 80 miles an hour blew down bombed out buildings in Germany, where five persons died of storm injuries. Three were buried alive in wreckage in Hannover, a man was killed in Muenster by flying debris, another in Wandsbeck by a falling power line. Fire, fanned by storm winds, swept a metal grinding factory in Hannoversch-Muenden with loss estimated at \$750,000. Shipping ran for cover in the Baltic and the English Channel as storm-tossed seas lashed coastlines. Defenses built up after the disastrous floods of just a year ago held out everywhere, however. Three small islands off the west coast of Scotland—Islay, Jura and Colonsay—were cut off from communication with the mainland.
