

# Lebanon Next For Vikings Tuesday On Home Floor

## Salem Wins 2nd in Row From Bend

Harold Hauk's Salem high Vikings after trouncing the Bend Lava Bears 64-36 Saturday for their second straight win over Bend, meet the Lebanon Warriors Tuesday night at Salem high. The Vikings beat the Lava Bears 71-51 Friday night.

Saturday night a third quarter surge gave the Vikings their third Big Six win against one loss. The Vikings, using only their starters for two quarters, tallied 24 points in the third period to seven for Glen Kinney's Bears. This sewed up the game and then the reserves came on again to hold to the lead.

Burkland Leads Surge  
Jim Crowell's field goal gave Bend an early lead but field goals by Bob Wulf and Gordy Domogalla put the Vikings out in front in the final minutes of the first quarter. Then Salem took over again to lead 11-9 with one-fourth of the game gone.

Phil Burkland led Salem to a 23-17 halftime lead as the reserve forward came through with seven points. Bend got one field goal in the second quarter but still were not out of the game.

Harold Hauk's squad came back on the floor in the third quarter and ran away from the Lava Bears. Bob Wulf sank seven points, Wayne Ericksen had six, Gordy Domogalla and Tom Dickens each had four, while Jim Knapp had three for the 24 Salem markers.

Bend Held to 7 Points  
Meanwhile the Salem defense was holding Bend to three field goals and one free throw for seven points and the Vikings held a commanding 47-24 third quarter lead. Once again the Salem second stringers came through as they extended the Salem lead by five points in the final quarter.

Burkland and Wulf tied for high point honors for the Salem team with each tallying 11. Bill Giltner paced the losers with nine. The junior varsity game was won once again by the Salem varsity reserves 52-49 as three last minute free throws broke up a tied up game.

Gary Peterson had 15 for the winners while Stan Pawley had 13. For the junior varsity Don Zeh came through with 18 to nab high point honors for the game.

DETROIT (AP)—Night-time prep school football and basketball faced a possible ban at Detroit's public schools Monday as a result of teen-age hoodlumism in which a boy was stabbed and badly hurt.

School superintendent Arthur Dondineau called a meeting of school principals at which he said he would demand a ban.

Five boys were held by police. They were among 12 who were arrested after what police called a "mob attack" on three players following a basketball game Friday night.

Ross DeRosier, 17, star center of the Mackenzie High team, was stabbed in the back with an ice pick. He and two teammates were attacked after their team had played a game with Central High.

Easy going E. J. (Dutch) Harrison, veteran trouper on golf's tournament trail, was \$2,000 richer Monday and the champion of the 1954 Bing Crosby 54 holes.

The old Arkansas Traveler of the fairways fronted his fellow professionals in the windup of the famed spar-with-par event with a three day total of 210. Harrison posted 71-68-71 respectively on three courses, Cypress Point, Monterey Peninsula and Pebble Beach.

Jimmy Demaree, veteran from Houston, shot 73-69-70 for 211 and \$1,250.

Third place and \$1,000 went to Tommy Bolt of Houston with 71-70-71.

The pro-amateur competition ended in a four-team tie with best ball totals of 193.

They were Marvin (Bud) Ward, Great Falls, pro, and Harvey Ward, 1952 British Amateur champion now of San Francisco; Walter Burkemo, Detroit, and Frank (lefty) O'Doul, manager of the San Diego Coast League baseball club; Art Wall Jr., Bessdale, Pa., and National Amateur champion Gene Litter of San Diego, and Doug Ford, Yonkers, N.Y., playing with Monty Menzies of Fort Worth, Tex.

Defending tournament champion Lloyd Mangrum started as the favorite but could do no better than a 217 and earnings of \$112.50.

PANAMA CITY, Panama (AP)—Sammy Snead, White Sulphur Springs, W. Va., has finally ended the jinx that Roberto DeVicenzo of Argentina held over him in the Panama Open Golf Tournament.

## Only 4 Major Hoop Teams Boast Unbeaten Records

NEW YORK (AP)—Kentucky, Duquesne, Western Kentucky and surprising Connecticut were the only major college basketball fives with unbeaten records today and the immediate offing holds little for the first three to worry about.

Kentucky, rolling in high gear with 11 straight, takes a none-too-formidable Tennessee Saturday night. Western Kentucky, unbeaten in 16 games, figures to add a pair of victims, Tennessee Tech and Memphis, to its skein this week, and the Ducks can rest on their 15-0 record until Jan. 27 when they meet Georgetown.

Only the high-scoring Connecticut quintet (14-0) can look to the future with some foreboding. Its next game, on Feb. 3, is against Fordham, another Eastern power and the best of the New York City clubs.

Kentucky, Duke's Win  
Last weekend, Kentucky, the nation's No. 1 ranking team in the latest Associated Press poll, wallowed Tulane 94-43 in a Southeastern Conference game. Duquesne, No. 2, deftly handled one of its toughest assignments by defeating Niagara 61-53. Western Kentucky, ranked fifth, thrashed Eastern Kentucky, its arch rival 122-78. Unranked Connecticut scored a convincing 106-81 win over Boston College.

Holy Cross and George Washington, ranked sixth and seventh respectively, both suffered their first setbacks Friday. The Crusaders fell victim to Notre Dame's collapsing defenses and dropped a lopsided 83-61 decision. George Washington bowed to Maryland 60-61.

Otherwise, the first 10 teams justified their high ratings. Indiana's third-ranked Hoosiers continued to dominate play in the Big Ten Conference by whipping Wisconsin 90-74. The Indiana five will attempt to make their league record 6-0 tonight against Ohio State.

Oklahoma Aggies Win  
In the usual possession-minded struggle between the schools the Oklahoma Aggies, No. 4, edged Tulsa 46-40.

Holy Cross got back on the victory road Saturday, trouncing Belmont Abbey of North Carolina 103-62. Oklahoma City, No. 8 with an 11-1 record, easily downed Murray State of Kentucky 72-43.

Rounding out the performances of the top 10 were Duke's 69-61 decision over McCurry Eagles, an independent team, and Minnesota's 59-55 verdict over Iowa.

In the second 10, 17th-ranked Dayton bowed to La Salle 82-58. Wichita (15-1) moved to the top of the Missouri Valley standings with a 91-61 victory over Detroit. The Kansas Jayhawks won their third Big Seven game, defeating Kansas State 65-62, and Louisiana State, led by Bob Pettit's 37 points, downed Tennessee 75-62.

Colorado A&M, No. 18, topped New Mexico 67-60, and Illinois, a notch lower, whipped Ohio State 82-79 in a Big Ten fray.

145 in 2 Nights  
Bevo Francis and Rio Grande came in for their share of the weekend scoring spotlight. The much-heralded center dropped in 61 points as the Ohio school drubbed Alliance (Pa.) 107-77 Friday and then followed it with an 84-point performance the following night in Rio Grande's 133-70 triumph against the same college.

Cornell remained on top of the Eastern league by defeating Dartmouth 79-58 for a 5-0 record in conference play.

In the Southeastern Conference, Alabama beat Auburn 70-53, Mississippi whipped Georgia Tech 80-67.

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## Pilots Overcome Gonzaga, 75-67

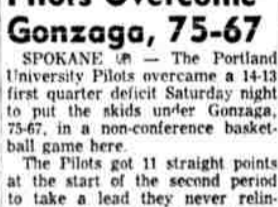
