Secret Committee to Tackle Memorial Job

The City of Salem is again tackling the problem of what to do with the fund left by the late Carroll Moores to give the city a memorial to Oregon pioneers.

This time it is being done through the medium of a committee appointed secretly by Mayor Al Loucks, and identity of which the mayor says is going to remain

secret. All the mayor will say is that it is a five-member committee.

The committee was appointed a week ago and has had one meeting. All that has leaked out is that there is talk a nationwide contest might be set going to arrive at something that would be suitable as a pioneer memorial.

The experiences of two previous committees haven't been such that make membership on the committee an enviable job. The first, appointed by former Mayor R. L. Ellstrom, was Chandler Brown, David Dunaway and Carroll Meeks. It asked the public for suggestions and the public came up with about 15, and a suggestion that the memorial be original statuary created for the purpose was given top rating, but nothing came of it.

Then a second committee took over, one appointed by Pioneer Trust Fund, which is custodian of the Moores fund, and two by the mayor. This committee was a Chandler Brown, Pietro Belluschi the architect, and Charles A. Sprague. It came up with a recommendation that the fund be used to buy Auguste Renoir's 'Venus Victorieuse' in the original, which was available. Public reaction against it was so severe the project was dropped.

The Moores fund now amounts to about \$33,000.

Linn County Pays For Slain Sheep

Albany — Linn county sheep, goat and poultry owners who suffered losses from killer dogs during 1953 will receive with few exceptions full compensation for their claimed losses for the first time in many years.

More than 100 stray dogs were killed by Pete Feidier, county dog officer, during the year throughout the county. Killing of the wandering dogs, County Clerk R. M. Russell noted, had much to do with keeping down losses. The court has allowed a total of \$2,492.75 of the \$2,559.75 claimed, lopping off only a total of \$67 from the claim total.

In all 148 claims for sheep losses, 19 for goats and 181 for poultry losses, were presented. Biggest single claim paid was received by Glenn P. and W. J. James, who lost 18 sheep, including 17 lambs and one ewe, for which they claimed \$213 and were allowed \$180. Roy Woolridge, who presented a \$112.50 claim for loss of 25 geese, was the heaviest poultry claimant. His claim was allowed in full.

Milk One Cent Lower in Eugene

EUGENE 18 — Milk will cost one cent a quart less beginning Feb. 1, Eugene producers and distributors decided Saturday. The reduction, which would result in milk costing 23 cents in stores and 23 1/2 cents per quart when delivered at home, was urged by William Weidel, state milk marketing administrator. Weidel said the present price "reflects unfavorably against the marketing administration and the industry." The state-established minimum for this area is 22 1/2 cents a quart in stores and 23 cents for home delivered. If the reduced price works a hardship on the producers and distributors, they can ask a hearing on having the price increased, Weidel said.

Abductors Face Kidnap Count

EUGENE 18 — Police rescued Bobby Calvin Roberts, a 15-year-old service station attendant, one hour after he had been abducted by a robber Saturday. The car carrying Roberts, Robert Lee Morris, 32, Florence, and Charles Roland Kibbe, 27, Eugene, was stopped by state police at Corvallis after an unidentified witness reported that the car driving north on the highway and that something apparently was wrong. The boy said Morris took \$52.50 from the service station after threatening him with a pistol. Morris was booked on a charge of armed robbery and kidnaping. Kibbe, who Sgt. Vern Hill said took no part in the affair, was booked on a charge of being drunk on a public highway.

Mrs. McLargue Is Division Supervisor

Mrs. Ruth T. McLargue has been appointed supervisor of the obstetric division of Salem General Hospital which will be in full operation in the new building about February 1 and her assistant will be Mrs. Elmera Richardson. The appointments were announced Sunday by Miss Lillian McDonald, superintendent of Salem General, during an open house when more than 2000 persons were shown the rooms and facilities of the new wing that is to be devoted to obstetrics and pediatrics. The new building, first unit of what is planned ultimately to be a complete three-wing hospital, is three stories of ultra-modern equipment and convenience.

over 600 c.f. of water used and eliminate flat rate. "(c) Increase the sewer service charge for water user who is on a flat rate for water, from the established flat rate of 75 cents to a flat rate commensurate with the use of the sewer. "(d) Apply and enforce the present regulations and schedule of fees for the sewer user who obtains only part, or none of his water supply from the municipal system. "(e) Increase the sewer connection fee, which covers only the permit and inspection, to an amount which will also cover the cost of a portion of the lateral sewer. Revenue from this source will come to a large extent from the newly annexed areas since that is where the greatest number of new connections will be made. "That operating revenues of the Water Department, based on rates which were established in 1916, be increased. An increase of this amount is required not only to finance water distribution in new areas, but is also required to place the Water Department on a sound operating program and to provide for debt service for large expenditures which must soon be made to increase the supply of water in the city. Annexations to the city will naturally hasten the day when the present supply is inadequate."

"1. That petitions for annexation should be signed by at least fifty per cent of the resident property owners in the area. "2. That upon receipt of a petition for annexation, it should be passed upon by the Planning and Zoning Commission as to whether it is a logical addition to the city, as to whether its size and shape are such as to make it the most practical unit in the general area involved, and as to whether its boundaries conform to a reasonable pattern for extension of the city boundaries. "3. That the City Administrator should make a report to the City Council as to the feasibility of providing city services to the area, estimates of costs, special problems involved, and financial ability of the city to provide the required services. "4. That acceptance of the area be considered by the Council in the light of the Planning and Zoning Commission's and the City Administrator's report as to whether the annexation is desirable and as to whether the City is capable at that time of furnishing the services required for the area. "5. That an area, upon acceptance, be treated the same as any other part of the city and that no special assessments be made for improvements in the area, other than those applying to all parts of the city. "6. That additional funds be made available immediately for water and sewer facilities as outlined below, to care for the needs of the present city, as well as the adjacent areas which may in the future become part of the city. "(a) Increase the residential sewer service charge. "(b) Increase the commercial base rate, and apply the present rate of .05 per 100 c.f. for excess
