Beverage
Chicken Pie with Yam Biscuits
Ingredients: 1/4 cup butter or margarine, 1/4 cup flour, 1 cup chicken stock, 1 cup milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 3 cups diced cooked chicken, 1 cup cooked diced carrots, 8 cooked small white onions, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, 1 cup sifted flour, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 cups mashed cooked yams or one No. 2 can (drained and mashed) yams, 1/2 cup shortening (melted), 1 egg (well beaten).

Method: Melt butter in saucepan over low heat; blend in 1/4 cup flour. Add chicken, stock and milk and cook and stir until thickened. Stir in 1 teaspoon salt, pepper, chicken, carrots, onions and parsley. Turn into greased 1 1/2 quart casserole. Sift 1 cup flour, baking powder and 1/2 teaspoon salt together. Add yams, melted shortening and egg; mix until blended. Turn out on lightly flour-ed board and roll out to 1/8-inch thickness. Top chicken mixture with yam dough and flute edges, sealing to sides of casserole. Bake in moderate (350F) oven, 40 minutes. Makes 6 servings.
