FAMILY DINNER
Chicken-Noodle Soup
Oriental Steak Dish

BEVERAGE
ORIENTAL STEAK DISH
Ingredients: 1 pound flank or round steak, 2 tablespoons oil, 1 clove garlic (minced), 1 cup beef consommé, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon ginger, 1 cup diagonally sliced celery, 1 1/2 cups diagonally sliced raw carrots, one 3-ounce can sliced broiled mushrooms, 1/2 cup sliced scallions, 2 tablespoons cornstarch, 1 tablespoon soy sauce, 1 teaspoon sugar.

Method: Cut flank steak across the grain in 1/4 inch strips about 2 inches long. Heat oil in frying pan. Add meat and brown quickly. Add garlic, consommé, salt, ginger, celery and carrots. Cover and bring to boil. Cook until vegetables are barely tender. Drain mushrooms, reserving the broth, then add drained mushrooms and scallions to meat mixture. Blend together and stir in soy sauce and sugar. Cook a nd stir until sauce thickens. Makes 4 servings.
