Factors Listed For Seed Crops

"Three factors: production, sup-ply, and use, establishe the mar-ket situation for field seed crops," Ray Teal, Oregon State College Seed Marketing Special-ist told 160 seed growers at Mar-ion County seed meeting at the Waldo Hills Community Club-house.

Teal continued by explaining that, generally speaking, two of the three factors are favorable for seed growers at present."Seed production was down from the 1952 crop for 13 of the 15 major seed crops. Greater use for seed crops may be brought about by such conditions as the southern drought and crop acreage con-

On the pessimistic side of seed production is the carry over of seed supplies. Harold Finnell, certification specialist at the col-lege, reviewed the need and procedure of crop certification, Mer-ion bluegrass and Kenland red clover are under the generation plan of seed certification where registered, foundation, or breeder's seedstock is required to cerer's seedstock is required to cer-tify the field. Just ordinary cer-tified seedstock will not qualify to produce certified seed of these particular crops.
