## Measure for O&C Timber

PORTLAND (UP) — The Oregon California Railroad Grant Lands Advisory Board, in a reversal of a previous recommendation, has agreed that either scaling or cruising be used to measure O&C timber for sale depending on the physical and economic factors involved.

In November the board had recommended to the Bureau of Land Management that scaling be the method used to measure the timber.

The board, meeting here yesterday with BLM officials, also appointed a subcommittee to work with the Bureau of Land Management in studying O & C logging road right-of-way regulations with a view to simplifying present procedures, and recommended that when there were no bids for O&C timber at the initial sale within the specific marketing area, the BLM have authority to waive marketing area requirements.

## New Strawberry Stands Rigid Tests

CORVALLIS (UP) — A decision will be made in the next 10 days on whether to release for planting this year a new strawberry that produced high yields in a test here.

Earl Price, director of the Oregon State College Experiment Station, said it produced eight tons of berries an acre on relatively poor soil in this area last year. In addition it is highly resistant to red stele disease and fairly resistant to viruses.

Price said still another new strawberry with even greater promise is being tested now. He said it might be ready for use by growers in a year or two.
