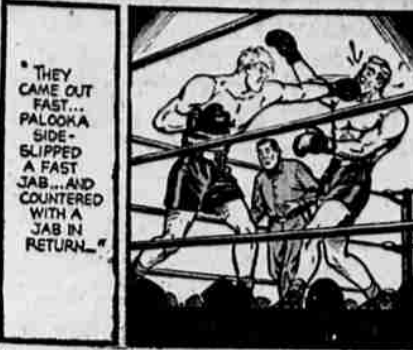

OSC Needs Clean Sweep Of Series With Oregon

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS The University of Oregon Ducks and Oregon State Beavers were knocking at the front door Monday in the Pacific Coast Conference Northern Division basketball race.

Oregon forged to the top of the standings with a 5-1 record during the past weekend by sweeping a two-game series with Washington, 77-76 on Friday night and 64-48 Saturday night.

Oregon State lost ground by splitting a pair with the Vandals, dropping the opener Friday night, 70-55, and taking Saturday's contest, 60-53.

Washington State drew a bye. Oregon and Oregon State hook up this week in a crucial series for both squads. They play at Corvallis Friday night and move to Eugene for the second game of the series Saturday night.

Washington steps out of the conference this Friday and Saturday night to play a two-game series with Brigham Young of the Sky-Line Conference at Seattle.

Oregon State dropped Idaho Saturday night with new strategy cooked up by coach Slat's Gill. Gill had three of his highest players, Swede Halbrook, Jay Dean and Tex Whiteman, pack the key while two speed merchants, Johnny Jarboe and Ron Funderland, handled the ball on the outside, until they could get a clear shot at the hoop or pass to the tall guys inside.

The strategy proved effective as it was aided and abetted by Halbrook's 27 points and Jarboe's 19. Oregon, hard-pressed Friday night, found the Huskies tough to handle during the first period Saturday night but put the handcuffs on Washington in the second period and left the floor at the half with a 42-27 bulge.
