

Doctor and Daughters Injured in Collision

A Salem doctor and two daughters suffered serious injuries in the collision of a train and two cars at the Center Street crossing of the Southern Pacific railroad tracks on 12th street Sunday morning while four persons in the other car escaped unhurt.

Four members of the Paul A. Morin family, 775 Clarman street, escaped injury when their car was knocked off the tracks by the car of Dr. John Bower, 40, a psychiatrist at Oregon State hospital, after it was hit by the train. Dr. Bower and his two daughters, Rosemary Ann, 16, and Margaret Adrian, 15, were taken to Salem General hospital. Dr. Bower was listed in fair condition Monday and the girls in good condition.

City police said the accident occurred as the two cars were heading east on Center street with the Morin car to the left and slightly ahead of the Bower car. Both drivers told officers they failed to see the 90-car freight train approaching from the south until they were in the intersection. Dr. Bower tried to stop and Morin attempted to get across the tracks, they said.

The train engine struck the Bower car near the right front door post, knocking it around in such a way that it struck the rear of the Morin car, which in turn was knocked clear of the tracks. The Bower car was carried on down the tracks for about 50 feet before the train came to a stop.

Engineer J. Dewitt Hamel, Portland, told officers he did not see the cars until Fireman James A. McClain, Portland, yelled "Look out." Then he "dynamited" the
