Amnesia Victim Is Surprised

COUNCIL BLUFFS, Iowa — Harold Long, who says he is an amnesia victim who came to his senses at Bonanza, Ore., wants to know where he was between Nov. 13, 1953, and Jan. 18, 1954.

A veteran who suffered a serious injury in World War II, the 32-year-old Council Bluffs man said: "Maybe I did something wrong. I did, I want to know. I want to know where I was and how I got to Oregon. How did I get money to go where I was? I could have written a bad check or done something. If anybody saw me during those two months, I wish they would let me know."

He said he found himself last Monday night sitting on a highway near Bonanza, 25 miles east of Klamath Falls, Ore. His pickup truck had just been involved in a collision between two gasoline trucks.

He then telephoned his wife in Iowa and began the trip home.

25 Ballots to Convict Owens

ROSEBURG — A circuit court jury deliberated 32 hours before finding Bert Owens guilty of second degree murder.

Owens, 49, was accused of first degree murder in the gunshot slaying of his Indian wife, Betty, 29, at their home at Riddle last Aug. 25.

The jury took 25 ballots before announcing its verdict Saturday night.

Owens is to be sentenced by Judge Carl E. Wimberly sometime this week.

Top of World Flight Ends

STOCKHOLM, Sweden (AP)—Scandinavian Airlines' Gorm Viking Super-Cloudmaster landed 40 minutes ahead of schedule here early today, completing a 6,000-mile test polar flight across the top of the world from Los Angeles.

The company hopes to inaugurate regular Scandinavia-to-Los Angeles passenger service on the route by May 1 if necessary agreements can be concluded with Canada and the United States. The airline's first trans-polar test flight was made in November, 1952.

The four-engine DC8B left Los Angeles Friday and flew by way of Edmonton, Alta.; Churchill, Man.; Frobisher Bay, in Canada's Northwest Territories; and Greenland.

'54 TRADE PACT SIGNED BY REDS

LONDON — The Russians have disclosed the signing of a new 1954 trade pact with the Chinese Communists. Official announcements of the agreement envisage a bit step-up in trade, but Western diplomats here believe the Soviet Union actually is having to cut down on vital tool and machinery shipments to her Red ally.

Mt. States Power Income \$1,825,497

PORTLAND (AP)—A net income of \$1,825,497 for the fiscal year ending Nov. 30 was reported Saturday by the Mountain States Power Co.

That is a slight gain over the previous year when the net income was \$1,601,578. A. W. Trimble of Albany, president of the firm, reported.

He said good water conditions this autumn and reduced power purchase costs were responsible. Mountain States soon may be merged with Pacific Power and Light Co. of Portland. Shareholders of the two firms are to vote March 12 on the merger plan.
