California Ham and Lima Casserole Mixed Green Salad Fruit Gelatin Beverage California Ham and Lima Casserole

Ingredients: 2 cups large dry limas, salt, 1 large onion (choplimas, sait, 1 large onton (chopped), 1 green pepper (chopped), 3 tablespoons bacon drippings or other fat. 1¼ pound smoked ham (diced), one 3-ounce can tomato sauce, ½ cup cooking sherry, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, pepper to taste, 1 clove garlic if desired (mineed).

Method: Rinse limas and cover with cold water. Soak overnight or for 6 to 8 hours. Bring slowly to boil in soaking water. Boil gently 30 minutes to 1 hour, just until tender but not mushy. Add 2 teaspoons salt toward end of cooking. Drain beans thoroghly. Cook onion and green pepper gently in bacon drippings for 5 minutes. Add ham; cook, stirring often, until ham begins to brown. Add tomato sauce, sherry, brown sugar, peper and garlie; mix wel Genaly stir in beans. Seasen with salt to taste. Turn into 2-quart casserole. Bake, uncovered, in moderate (350 F.) oven 1½ hours. Makes 6 servings.
