SUNDAY NIGHT SUPPER

- California Ham and Lima Casserole
- Mixed Green Salad
- Fruit Gelatin
- California Ham and Lima Casserole

Ingredients: 2 cups large dry limas, salt, 1 large onion (chopped), 1 green pepper (chopped), 3 tablespoons bacon drippings or other fat, 1 1/4 pound smoked ham (diced), one 8-ounce can tomato sauce, 1/2 cup cooking sherry, 2 tablespoons brown sugar, pepper to taste, 1 clove garlic if desired (minced).

Method: Rinse limas and cover with cold water. Soak overnight or for 8 to 10 hours. Bring slowly to boil in soaking water. Boil gently 30 minutes to 1 hour, just until tender but not mushy. Add 2 teaspoons salt toward end of cooking. Drain beans thoroughly. Cook onion and green pepper gently in bacon drippings for 5 minutes. Add ham; cook, stirring often, until ham begins to brown. Add tomato sauce, sherry, brown sugar, pepper and garlic; mix well. Gently stir in beans. Season with salt to taste. Turn into 2-quart casserole. Bake, uncovered, in moderate (350 F.) oven 1 1/2 hours. Makes 6 servings.
