"Notre Dame-ology": Material doesn't just pour into South Bend because boys dream of playing for the Irish. "We can get all we want of what I'll call the Class B boys," good boys but not great like the kind of greats needed to win at Notre Dame. The university really goes out after 22 freshmen each year, but not being able to offer as much as other big time schools, Leahy asserted, saying there were only 22 scholarships available.

About 80 per cent of Notre Dame players are Catholics. There are five assistant coaches to help handle the squad of 100 which dwindles to 75, and Leahy claimed his squad had one of the highest general I.Q. in the nation. No one can enter Notre Dame unless he is in the upper third of his high school class, and that applies to athletes, too, Leahy asserted.
