## Cortisone Used in Diagnosis Of Advanced Glands Cancer

PORTLAND — Cortisone has been used in the diagnosis of cancer of the adrenal glands and in aiding recovery from surgery. Dr. Peter H. Forsham of San Francisco reported here Friday.

Presenting papers at a meeting of the Western Society for Clinical Research, Dr. Forsham, associate professor at the University of California Medical School, said administration of cortisone could be used to determine whether the adrenal glands are tumorous, cancerous or enlarged.

This, Dr. Forsham pointed out, indicates to the surgeon what he will find in an operation and makes possible the proper approach and planning.

When adrenal glands, which produce cortisone, become too active they cause what is known as Cushing's disease. The victim becomes fat, weak, suffers loss of muscle strength, has high blood pressure and diabetes.

This can be treated by complete removal of the adrenal glands with administration of cortisone artificially to make up the deficiency which the body would normally require.

In the use of cortisone in operations, Dr. Forsham said research showed that the adrenal glands are activated during the course of surgery, producing cortisone to strengthen the patient.

With this knowledge, cortisone may now be administered before, during and after the operation to help the patient through the ordeal. This has cut the post-operating mortality rate to virtually zero in research cases, he said.

Dr. Forsham reported, too, that removal of both adrenal glands in 25 cases of cancer of the breast had stopped the progress of the cancer in half the cases for periods as long as two years. After that, however, the cancer became active again.

The society Friday elected Dr. David Rytand of the Stanford Medical School, San Francisco, president, and Dr. Blair V. Jager of the University of Utah College of Medicine, Salt Lake City, vice president. Dr. Henry Brainerd of the University of California School of Medicine at San Francisco, and Dr. William N. Valentine of the University of California School of Medicine at Los Angeles were elected councillors for three year terms.
