

Sessions to Open Tuesday

The first session of the three-day convocation for ministers and laymen, Oregon Council of Churches, will be held at the First Christian Church Tuesday afternoon when Dr. Henry Hitt Crane of Central Methodist Church, Detroit, Mich., speaks on the subject "The Modern Relevance of Protestant Principles."

This year's convocation will stress inspirational purposes rather than formal business of the council. All sessions will be held at the First Christian Church.

A two-hour panel and discussion concerning the church's mission in world affairs will be held from 2:45 to 4:45 Tuesday afternoon with C. A. Sprague, Salem; Dr. Paul Means, University of Oregon; Dr. U. G. Dubach, Lewis and Clark College; Bernard Fedde, American Friends Service; and Prof. Thomas Bennett, Willamette University, participating. Governor Paul L. Patterson will be the principal speaker at the banquet to be held at 6:30 Tuesday night. This will be followed by a mass meeting at 8 o'clock when Dr. Crane will be the principal speaker.

The convocation will extend through Wednesday and will close with a luncheon meeting Thursday noon with Bishop Stephen Bayne of the Olympia diocese giving the address.

Troops Sent to Quell Uprising

BEIRUT, Lebanon (AP)—Reports reaching here Monday said Syrian troops have gone into action to put down a revolt of restless Druse tribesmen in southern Syria. Three Druse villages reportedly have been destroyed and about 15 others damaged.

The reported uprising came after Syrian President Col Adib Shishki last week proclaimed martial law in several areas of his country and arrested 12 opposition leaders whom he accused of "openly calling for mutiny and disturbance." Shishki said then there had been attacks on troops in various parts of Syria.

With strict censorship apparently blocking direct word from Damascus, Syria's capital, one well-informed source here said Druse village had been wiped out by a 12-hour artillery bombardment.

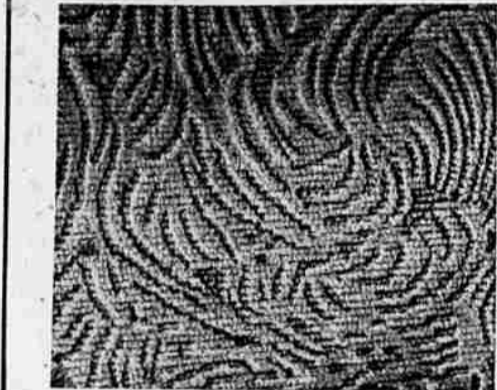

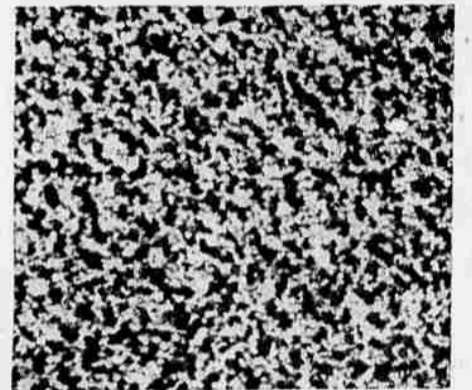

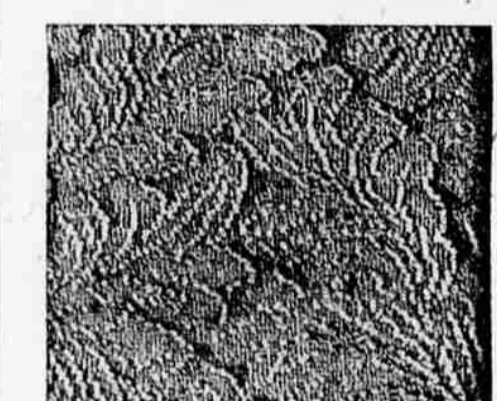
